## Scientists trying to find out cause of earthquake

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — Scientists trying to determine the cause of the massive Alaskan earthquake suspect it originated in the Fairweather Fault, one of the many cracks that mar the structure of the earth. Seismologists at the University of California said Sunday the quake was, in simple terms, an "underground rebound" caused by strain or pressure. The theory that the quake started in the Fairweather Fault was backed up by the fact that the epicenter, or heart, of the quake was pinpointed at Yakutat Bay, about 350 miles southeast of Anchorage on the Alaskan coast. The fault begins in the bay and runs for several hundred miles along the coast. The quake apparently occurred from 30 to 60 miles beneath the earth's surface, they said. The scientists said the quake could be compared to the quivering of a lump of jelly. Assume the earth is jelly and

someone has run a knife through it. The cut would be a fault. Strain sets the jelly into motion, either deepening the cut or closing it. In either case, the motion spreads through the jelly, causing it to quiver. Thus the earth shook and Alaskans experienced the sickening sensation of the earth in motion. Seismologists were in Alaska taking hundreds of photographs and measurements in an attempt to determine the exact cause. To measure the intensity of a quake, seismologists use the scale developed by Dr. Charles Richter of the California Institute of Technology. The scale is based on the logarithm of the distance a needle is moved by a quake. The scale is numbered from 1 upward. Each number on the scale represents a shock 10 times greater than the preceding number.

## Gen. McArthur takes bad turn

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur, fighting to recover from his third major operation this month, today developed new complications—kidney trouble and internal hemorrhaging and officials said it was a "matter of grave concern." In a medical bulletin issued this morning, a hospital spokesman said there had been a "decreased kidney action since last evening" and "this is a matter of grave concern." "Unfortunately there has been a recurrence of internal bleeding from the esophagus," the spokesman said. The aging general underwent emergency surgery Sunday for removal of a portion of his intestine. It was his third operation this month. His second operation last Monday was performed to stop hemorrhaging in his esophagus—the tube carrying food from the mouth to the stomach. One good sign doctors noted this morning, however, was stabilizing blood pressure and pulse.

**TRUCKS ROLL**  
The Bend Fire Department extinguished a grass fire Saturday afternoon adjacent to Gray's Garage, 123 E. Greenwood Avenue. A cigarette was blamed for the blaze. There was no damage. A run Sunday to Hill Street and N. First failed to locate a fire, and the call was listed as a false alarm.

People clustered together in tiny groups to look at similar clusters of people across the river, which once had been spanned by a highway bridge. The bridge, broken into three sections, was in a mudflat, a quarter of a mile inland, near Cannon Beach. Part of the bridge was sitting among four massive trees, as though a playing child had placed it there. These were among the sights seen today by Warner Nunn, executive assistant to Gov. Mark Hatfield, in an air tour of Oregon coastal areas damaged by Friday night's tidal wave. Ralph McGinnis, assistant state aeronautics director, piloted the state plane over some beaches that had been swept amazingly clean of every log and trace of debris. Other beaches, for no apparent reason, were a tumbled mass of logs.

**People Stare**  
At Beverly Beach, where a couple's four children apparently had been swept to their death, cars were stopped along the highway and people stared at the log-piled beach. At Waldport, where the crazy actions of the tidal wave sucked the harbor nearly dry, docks and boats had been swept into the ocean. The hulls of sunken boats could be seen beneath the surface of the water. At Depoe Bay, Waldport and Delake, ramps led to docks that were no longer there. We landed at Astoria and heard reports of huge logs being hurled like matchsticks hundreds of feet into the air. At Astoria, Newport and other coastal port towns, log rafts had been torn apart and logs were scattered everywhere. The view was a fantastic contrast to the terror and uncertainty of the night before. The Pacific was so calm that swells could hardly be seen and breakers rolled lazily up to the beaches. But there were clues to the savage power of the sea. Vast areas of the coastal waters were churned a deep brown by mud and sand sucked from the ocean floor. U. S. Highway 101 was jammed with cars of people who came to look. Dozens of light planes streaked up and down the beaches and circled over the damaged areas.

## Arrest clears six burglaries

Oregon State Police reported today that the arrest over the weekend of two local youths apparently has cleared six different burglaries in Bend, including the entering of Sambo's Friday night. In that entry, a large plate glass window was smashed and about \$160 taken. Arrested by State Police were David Arthur Conken, 18, a resident of 5 Hastings Place, and Tommie Stuart Harrington, 17, who lives on the South Highway. Conken is expected to be remanded from juvenile court to district court to face a charge of burglary not in a dwelling. Harrington will probably be remanded to juvenile court. Officers said that some of the money missing from Sambo's had been recovered in the home of one of the boys. Officers said that cases cleared with the apprehension of the youths included burglaries of the Les Schwab Tire Co., Kurtz Fly Co., Union Oil bulk plant, all in Bend and reported entered on March 17; the state liquor store at Gilchrist, burglarized on February 29, and a grocery store in Crescent, entered early in March.

## Christians observe Easter

Christians across the nation celebrated the church's most joyous holy day Sunday with traditional sunrise services and colorful Easter parades. Religious services proclaiming the risen Christ took on a somber touch in many churches with prayers for the thousands of persons affected by the earthquake that ravaged Alaskan cities on Good Friday and sent tidal waves crashing against the Pacific Coast. In Birmingham, Ala., evangelist Billy Graham addressed an estimated 40,000 persons—the largest integrated audience in the history of the state—and called upon them to commit their lives to Christ. More than 50,000 persons filed quietly past the grave of President Kennedy in Washington's Arlington National Cemetery. Thousands of New Yorkers in bright bonnets and their Sunday best crowded down Fifth Avenue in the nation's No. 1 Easter parade.

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## Note in plane aids search for Boldway

GRANTS PASS (UPI)—A note left in the cabin of a wrecked small plane and a suitcase hidden under brush along the Little Chetco River were clues today in the search for George Boldway, Grants Pass businessman missing since March 1.

The wreckage of his small plane was found smashed against a ridge Friday. The craft had disappeared March 1 on a flight from Crescent City, Calif., to Grants Pass.

Josephine County Sheriff Lloyd Lewis said Sunday that searchers had discovered a note in the plane's cabin. It read: "Going downstream."

A further search along the banks of the Little Chetco turned up a suitcase that Boldway had in the plane with him when he crashed. There was some blood in the plane cabin and it was presumed he had been hurt when his craft zipped through a tree top and smashed against the ridge in the rugged Siskiyou Mountains.

Lewis said the crew which put down at the crash site Saturday spotted old footprints in the snow near the wreck.

Although it seemed obvious that Boldway walked away from the crash, Sheriff Lewis said he held little hope that Boldway would be found alive. He said there was a chance, a slim one, that Boldway was in a mountain cabin along the river, but added, "He wouldn't stay away for 30 days. No one would, if he could help it."

Searchers resumed their hunt today.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—An ex-convict from Oregon faced arraignment today on a charge of murder in the fatal shootings of a woman and her daughter from Southern California.

The suspect, Roy W. Osborn, 36, Portland, was arrested minutes after midnight Friday when he drove the victims' car into a downtown hotel garage. Noticing blood inside the car and a revolver on the front seat, a garage attendant notified police.

Sheriff's deputies found the bodies of Mrs. Inez Mulloy, 50, and her daughter, Mrs. Norma Widick, 23, both of San Gabriel, Calif., in a remote desert area 15 miles southwest of here.

The women had come here to pick up a truck abandoned by Mrs. Widick's estranged husband, Gaynard, 26. She had filed a missing persons report on her husband last Thursday but he returned to San Gabriel Sunday unaware of the slayings.

Clark County sheriff's deputies said Osborn has a record of auto theft and burglary convictions.
