

Prineville scene of band festival

PRINEVILLE — Once again the sound of music will echo through downtown Prineville this weekend, as Prineville music students host the Central Oregon Band Festival. Gary Stephenson, Crook county music supervisor, will be in charge of local arrangements.

Stephenson said yesterday that some 300 music students are expected to attend the festival and clinic, from Bend, Redmond, Madras, Prineville, John Day and Burns.

The two guest clinicians will be Max Dalbey, director of band music, Utah State University and Caleb Standafer, trombonist and clinician, Cottage Grove high school.

The program of events will begin Friday evening, April 3, with a dance band clinic, Stephenson said. Throughout Saturday, horns will tootle and drums will thump as each school band plays for criticism and suggestion.

Saturday afternoon, an honor band will hold a rehearsal session, followed by a public concert of all bands at 8 p.m. in the high school gymnasium. Each school band will play two numbers, the honor dance band will play and the honor band will climax the program, under the baton of Dalbey.

Sky divers to parachute over Hoodoo

Sky divers will float through the Cascade sky above Hoodoo Bowl Sunday, April 5.

John Murray and Hugh Rosenberg of Corvallis will "buzz" the snow bowl a little before 2 p.m. on Sunday, in a yellow Cessna plane, pilot of which will be selected later.

The plane will climb to 12,000 feet altitude.

At that elevation, Murray and Rosenberg will exit the plane, directly above bowl, and will freefall for 18 seconds, to an elevation of 8,500 feet, where chutes will be opened.

The target of the two parachutists will be in the small, open meadow near the lodge.

The flight from Corvallis to Hoodoo will be made with doors of the plane open — and doors will remain open as the plane climbs to 12,000 feet.

Announcement of the demonstration planned by the Corvallis sky divers was announced here by Ed M. Thurston, operator of the Hoodoo ski area.

Newbill recovers from car mishap

REDMOND — Robert Newbill, 32, Redmond, former owner of Office Boy Stationery Stores in Bend and Madras, is recuperating at Woodland Park Hospital in Portland from serious multiple injuries received two weeks ago when his car struck a traffic divider in Parkrose.

According to Mrs. Newbill, who has been at his side most of the time, Newbill suffered a broken jaw, facial fractures, broken ribs and a fractured ankle, as well as deep cuts under his chin and on his legs.

His recovery has been complicated by infection in a deep gouge on his left leg, where physicians have made skin grafts. Because of complications, it has been difficult to set the broken ankle, she said.

If all goes well, Newbill hopes to be transferred to Central Oregon for further treatment within a week.

Forest staff officer becomes Fremont ranger

Effective on April 12, William D. Shenk, Deschutes National Forest staff officer in Bend, is to become ranger in charge of the Warner Ranger District, Fremont National Forest. He will be stationed at Lakeview.

Shenk's successor on the Deschutes headquarters staff will be Ray Bennett, at present Bend District Ranger. He will be succeeded as head of the Bend district by Henry McCormick, a 30-year veteran of the U.S. Forest Service who is at present ranger on the Warner district.

Shenk, a graduate from the University of Massachusetts School of Forestry, has been with the U.S. Forest Service for the past nine years, with his first assignment at Seneca. He came to Bend in October, 1959, first to serve on the timber management staff, then as assistant ranger on the Bend District. He has held his present staff officer position, assisting with fire control, land use and winter sports, since 1962. He replaced Dick Chase on the Deschutes staff in Bend.

For the past several seasons, Shenk has served as assistant leader of the Bachelor Butte ski patrol. Shenk, his wife Vicky and their three children, Diane, Karen and Thomas, will leave for Lakeview on April 8.

Like Shenk, McCormick, who will come here from Lakeview with his wife Bernice, is an ardent skier.

REDMOND — Snow depth and moisture content on courses in the Central Oregon Cascades are about three times the amount at this time last year, according to Darwin Gregg, Madras, and Jack Gillette, Silver Lake, SCS technicians, who have just completed March measurements with the assistance of James Grino, Tumalo Irrigation District, and Ed Park, Bend photographer.

Measurements were: Paulina Lake, 57.2 snow with 18.8 water; Paulina fire road, 23.6 with 7.8; Paulina Y, 4.7 with 2.2; Waldo Lake, 110.8 with 38.7; Irish Taylor Lake, 127.7 with 44.3; Caldwell Ranch, 37.8 with 12.6; Windigo Pass, 130.5 with 50; Willamette Pass, 130 with 50; New Crescent Lake, 57.7 with 19.4; Mowich, 17.5 with 6.3; Dutchman Flat, 129.7 with 55.7; Tangent, 63.8 with 25 and Hungry Flat, 15 with 5.7.

The Bend Business and Professional Women's Club enjoyed a bird's eye view of pre-disaster Alaska at a regular dessert meeting at the home of Mrs. Willard B. Hollenbeck.

The president, Mrs. Ken J. Holman, introduced Mrs. Don Denning, the guest speaker. Mrs. Denning, at the time of her trip, was president of women in the eighth province of the Episcopal Church. In this capacity she traveled over 10 states doing missionary leadership training.

The Alaskan tour took Mrs. Denning by plane and dog sled through all of the important towns and into the more primitive country to the far north. Here, people of many races seem to get along well together. Color doesn't matter, she said.

Tuberculosis is very prevalent on account of lack of sunlight for long periods. The Eskimo boys are sent at the age of six years to government schools but the girls have had no formal education until the last five years when grade schools were introduced.

When the boys return at the age of 16 years they are totally unprepared for the primitive life of their people. They marry and have no jobs and this is the cause of much poverty.

The Eskimos are a very generous hearted people with a deep reverence for God and love for each other, the speaker said. She brought back many gifts of beautiful bead work and ivory.

Mrs. Nellie Hollenbeck was co-hostess. There were 12 present including two guests, Mrs. Robert E. Hill and Miss Epsie Cox.
