## Park body considers possibility of Prineville Reservoir resort

PRINEVILLE — The Crook county park commission met Monday evening in special session to consider another problem that arose in recent days to slow the progress towards starting construction of a resort at the Prineville Reservoir.

A major headache developed for the park commission, and county judge Ervin Grimes, when the county tax assessor notified those concerned that taxes on the property, if it were to be leased for the resort, would be some \$500 per acre.

## Delinquency by juveniles less during past week

PRINEVILLE — A marked decrease in all phases of juvenile delinquency in the Prineville area was noted this week by Gerald Hogland, juvenile officer. Only phase of the varied problems that has not decreased, Hogland said, is in shoplifting, but he added that increased cooperation between merchants and city police would account for that factor.

Hogland said city police and merchants agree that there is less vandalism, other types of pilfering, and cases of minors in possession of alcoholic beverages.

He attributed much of the credit for the decrease to the firmer stand being taken by the juvenile court and a more direct program that has been started for treating repeated offenders. In the latter program, he said, one method that has met with success in some cases is the removal of the chronic problem child from the environment that seems to cause the problem.
