Scientists in Colorado set time back .1 second

BOULDER, Colo. (UPI)—If it wasn't for a group of scientists at the National Bureau of Standards laboratory here, the Sun someday might set at midnight.

And that's no April Fool's Day joke.

The group—which prefers to remain anonymous—kicks the official time for the United

States back a little bit every once in a while, to compensate for a slowing down of the earth's rotation speed.

Today, they planned to set time back 1-10 of a second.

One of the spokesmen explained "drag of the tides, and the Moon and the other planets" cause the fractional slowing, which has been happening "for at least 4,000 years."

Pickets halt moonport labor

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Picket lines by protesting guards at the nation's huge moonport today turned away many construction workers and threatened to shut down space building for the second time in six weeks.

The picket lines were thrown up before daybreak at three main entrances to the \$450 million moon rocket complex now under construction on Merritt Island in a dispute centering around the employment of non-union guards to replace a handful of union guards.

Many of the 3,400 construction workers honored the picket lines despite a request by their union leaders to report to work. It was not immediately determined how many workers showed up at their jobs.

New Hampshire gets slight earthquake

LACONIA, N.H. (UPI)—A slight earthquake shook central New Hampshire today, the third tremor in New England in five months.

The tremor at 6:21 a.m. EST shook houses and roused sleeping occupants. Many persons ran out of their homes.

Some said it sounded like a thundering train or truck. One woman said she felt the earth shaking beneath her feet.

The Rev. Francis J. Donohoe of the Weston College seismograph station described the earthquake as "a very small one."

Father Donohoe said it "was too small to make an accurate determination of its position" but that it appeared to be centered in the Lake Winnepesaukee area.

"They have these shakes every so often," Father Donohoe said. He said it was not related to the destructive earthquake in Alaska last Friday.

Dartmouth College geologists said the area was earthquake prone.

No injuries were reported.

Demos must accept responsibility for Fulbright's talk—Barry

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater said Tuesday night the Democratic party must assume the responsibility for Sen. J.W. Fulbright's controversial foreign policy speech last week.

"This is their baby and the Republicans should not let the citizens of this country forget it," Goldwater said in a campaign speech at a \$100-a-plate dinner here.

Goldwater made Fulbright's speech his prime target in the address with which he wound up two days of campaigning for California's crucial Republican presidential primary June 2. He returned to Washington early today.

Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Com-

mittee, called for a re-examination of long-held beliefs and "myths" about the cold war. He said the nation should dare to think the "unthinkable" and called for a new look at our policies pertaining to Panama and Cuba.

Goldwater said Fulbright, D-Ark., had urged "the reality of Munich" on one hand while on the other, the White House indicated that the Democratic party's chief foreign policy spokesman spoke only for himself.

"Doesn't anyone in this administration talk to anyone else before they try to commit this nation?" Goldwater asked.

He said that Fulbright falsely assumes that both sides in the cold war have "repudiated a policy of total victory."

Tacoma parents who lost four children in tidal wave plan to restart family over again

NEWPORT, Ore. (UPI)—The mother of four children snatched from an Oregon beach Friday night by a tidal wave believes she has learned too much about bringing up children to have it all go to waste.

"The only answer now is for my husband and me to start all over and have a new family," Rita McKenzie, 29, said from her bed at Pacific Community Hospital here.

Mrs. McKenzie and her husband Monte, 33, Tacoma, Wash., were camped with their four children at Beverly Beach state

park a few miles south of here when the tidal wave generated by Alaska's shattering earthquake struck.

As Mrs. McKenzie described it in an interview with the Corvallis Gazette-Times, they were awakened shortly after 11 p.m. by a small wave.

"It was a small one, but the water woke us up," the dark haired woman said. "We grabbed the kids. But then came huge waves, one after another—battering waves—nothing like ordinary tides. We were completely helpless."

beach. He tried to haul some passing motorists. None stopped, and McKenzie ran to the park ranger's house. The ranger quickly called police.

Mrs. McKenzie, after being pulled out to sea, was swept back to the beach. Lincoln County sheriff's deputies found her unconscious about 400 yards from the family campsite.

The McKenzies are no strangers to tragedy. Seven months ago their eldest daughter, Susanne, 9, died of burns.

Ghana calls for aid plan

GENEVA (UPI)—The West African Republic of Ghana today called for a joint East-West "Marshall plan" to mobilize help for the have-not nations of the world.

The plea was presented by Ghana's Foreign Minister Kojo Botsio to the delegates of 122 nations attending the United Nations conference on trade and development.

"An international plan similar to the Marshall Plan now is needed, organized on a truly international basis and this time for the benefit of the less developed countries," he told the delegates.

Warning that scattered individual measures have proved to be inadequate to promote the economic emancipation of the emerging nations he urged a "departure from old modes of thinking and form traditional attitudes toward international trade and development . . ."
