On Saturday morning, there will be a workshop, with classes to be held in several different rooms of the Junior High building. The workshop will deal with ceremonial, camp music, song leadership, the making of simple music instruments, singing games and folk dancing.

There will be a banquet at the Pilot Butte Inn Saturday night. Preceding the banquet, on Saturday afternoon at the gymnasium, there will be a songfest, open to all Girl Scouts and Junior Girl Scouts of the area.

Cadet and senior Girl Scouts are expected from Klamath Falls, Bend, Eugene and points between.

Highway Department to receive bids on Horse Ridge project

The Oregon State Highway Commission at its April 21 meeting in Salem will receive bids on 25 different projects, one of them calling for completion of work now under way on the Horse Ridge section of U.S. Highway 20 east of Bend.

The new work calls for the grading and paving of a 2.97 mile unit of the section, this to link to the west end of the unit where work is in progress. The new unit will provide two 12-foot travel lanes with additional 12-

foot climbing lanes on the ascending grades.

Two projects are scheduled for Jefferson County, one on the Santiam Highway and the other on The Dalles - California route. The Santiam Highway project calls for paving 3.87 miles of the Suttle Lake - Deschutes County line section. The asphaltic concrete paving will provide two 12-foot travel lanes and four-foot shoulders. The project is scheduled for completion in September.

The project on U.S. Highway 97 calls for an asphaltic concrete pavement overlay on the Willowsdale - Lyle Gap section. This project covers a distance of 4.4 miles. The improvement will provide two 12-foot travel lanes with an additional 11-foot climbing lane on steep grades. The work will start approximately 13 miles north of Madras, with completion set for the coming summer.

Other projected work for which bids will be called includes an asphaltic concrete pavement overlay on five miles of the Sherman Highway between the Bakeoven and Rooper Roads.

Special guests invited to visit the Festival include Mr. and Mrs. Ervina Grimes, Prineville; Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Weber, Paulina, and Mr. and Mrs. Luke Reif, Powell Butte. Mrs. Art Sawyer, district director, Burns, is also expected to be among those present.

To bring the Home Economics unit projects more dramatically to the public, the various units of the county will have exhibits in downtown stores prior to the Festival.
