Goldwater opens campaign with eulogy for Mac

PORTLAND (UPI)—Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater opened his Oregon presidential campaign today with a eulogy for Douglas MacArthur and said if the nation had heeded the general's advice "Korea would not have been a disgrace and Southeast Asia would not now be under the heel of Communist dictatorship."

Goldwater arrived Sunday for an afternoon of rest and conferences with staff and campaign workers.

Today's schedule included a news conference, industrial park tour, luncheon speech, visits to suburban areas, and a 30-minute statewide television appearance.

The senator arrived after the announcement of MacArthur's death and issued a statement terming the general "one of America's greatest soldiers and one of its finest citizens."

In remarks prepared for delivery at a luncheon today, Goldwater said of MacArthur:

"Our greatest tribute to his memory would be to heed his warnings and follow his examples."

"He was a man with a sense of destiny...born to lead...and he did not falter in the gravest hours of his and our nation's trial."

"The general repeatedly warned us of the pitfalls of communism, almost from the emergence of the Soviet Union as a major power."

"General MacArthur was fearless in speaking out when his country was in danger from unwise leadership."

"No man in his time survived more public abuse and no man in his time has a longer record of being right more often."

"Every fiber of his being was dedicated to making America strong and keeping her safe. By example and training he helped prepare the military leaders of today who, more often than not, are being bypassed in matters of our national defense just as he was bypassed at a critical time."

A total of 1,114 drivers will be honored over the entire state.

To earn a safe driving award, a State Highway employee must drive 55 per cent of his working time during the year and must do it without becoming involved in a preventable accident.

Moclips spill probe planned

SEATTLE (UPI)—A special committee to investigate the Moclips oil spill that virtually wiped out Washington's commercial clam digging industry was appointed Sunday by the Legislative Council.

Rep. Dick J. Kink, D-Bellingham, was named chairman of the three-man committee. He said the committee would begin to look into the matter "at the earliest possible date."

Sen. Don L. Talley, D-Kelso, who demanded the investigation, was named vice chairman. The third member is Rep. Harry Syler, R-Randall.

Talley told the council "some bad mistakes were made" last month when salvage crews were trying to free a 2.5 million gallon oil barge from a sandbar near Moclips.

Thousands of gallons of Diesel oil were eventually pumped into the surf to lighten the load on the barge and speed up its removal from the bar.

Chairman Earl Coe of the Pollution Control Commission said that if the oil had not been dumped, the barge might have broken up and spilled its entire cargo.

U.S. council lists Oregon's safety needs

CHICAGO (UPI)—The National Safety Council Sunday issued a list of priority needs to upgrade traffic safety in Oregon.

The list was compiled for each state in the Union in cooperation with state and local agencies.

The council said Oregon should adopt the Implied Consent Law which, in accidents where drunken driving is suspected, a driver is deemed to have given consent to a chemical test if an officer suspects the operation of a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

Adoption of maximum speed limits was also recommended.

The council suggested the state collect and analyze accident data in planning and evaluating school safety education programs and enact legislation requiring the use of a uniform accident report form by all police agencies.

Greatly expanded driver education programs were recommended along with authority of the Department of Education to enforce certification standards for driver education teachers.

Expanded training programs for new traffic engineers and in-service training for traffic engineering personnel was recommended.

The council suggested stricter requirements for obtaining and retaining the driving privilege and a statewide program of periodic motor vehicle inspection.

In its report, the council noted that the National Governors' Conference has recommended that all states adopt interstate compacts on driver licensing and vehicle equipment.

Money provided for sewer plans

MADRAS — Senators Wayne Morse and Maurice B. Neuberger, and Congressman Al Ullman have announced that a new sanitary sewer system to prevent water pollution in Madras will be planned with a \$4-700 public works planning advance through the Community Facilities Administration.

The completed project will cost an estimated \$668,100 with \$500,100 of that amount in construction costs. Construction is scheduled to start in mid-1965.

Feeder cattle were steady, with slaughter cattle bringing 50 cents more, according to the weekly report issued by Robert Sterling, county agent.

School budget hearing slated

REDMOND — Public hearing on the new grade school budget will be held tonight at 8 o'clock in the John Tuck School, reports Superintendent Hugh Hartman.

Up some \$43,000 over last year, the budget proposes an increased tax levy for 1964-65, amounting to approximately 13 mills. The increase is due to a \$70,000 loss in revenue from the state because of the district's valuation increase, and the addition of \$35,000 for faculty increments and the addition of five new teachers.

The total budget has been set at \$481,495.50. Amount of revenue needed to balance the budget is \$368,799.20, including \$50,868.51 for delinquent taxes.

Crippling rail strike moves into second day

BUTTE, Mont. (UPI)—A crippling strike by 73 railroad trainmen went into its second day today after closing down all mining operations here and threatening to idle 6,500 workers.

The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen members left their jobs Sunday morning in a strike against the Butte, Anaconda & Pacific Railroad, which is owned by the Anaconda Co. and hauls ore and concentrates between Butte and Anaconda.

The strike immediately affected 278 employees of the railroad and 4,000 workers in the Butte mines, concentrators and shops of the Anaconda Co. The mining firm immediately closed its Butte operations and began to shut down its smelter at Anaconda.

Local union President Rodney McLean said the walkout resulted from the company's refusal to comply with a union notice requesting revision of existing agreements on job protection, retraining, supplemental pensions and sickness and leave benefits.
