REDMOND — Potato inspections for the season 1963-64 in Central Oregon total 6574 400-cwt. carlots to date, according to W. R. Stanard, district supervisor of the Shipping Point Inspection Service.

This compares to 4590 carlots for the same period last year. In March, 916 carlots were inspected, 355 shipped by rail, 289 by truck and 272 diverted to uses other than the fresh market.
