Track and field results apply pressure on Bruins

He's back looking at sports after a week of doing other things, and the Sportslooker offers a sign of relief. He has returned to the sports world.

Taking a look at last weekend from the standpoint of track and field performances, it was quite a weekend. Bend did itself a job on the Oregon-California Relays at Southern Oregon College last Saturday, but there are some things, in addition, that are interesting to pass on.

Clyde Smith continues to put the shot out there where the others don't. Smith's heave of 53-10 3/4 won the Class B division hands down, but bettered the mark of Medford's Tungate who tossed the iron ball only 51-2 1/4.

Smith, Top Notch

Smith, indeed, is a top notch shot putter. But let's take a look elsewhere in the state. A 200 pound fellow at Cottage Grove by the handle of Al Richards came up with an astonishing effort of 60-1 1/4 last weekend against Springfield.

If Smith is going to get anywhere near state honors this year he had better take a look at Richards. Not only has Richards tossed the ball the phenomenal distance, but he has set his eyes on the national high school record of 69-3 as his eventual goal for this year.

Richards, a Cottage Grove senior, is quite an athlete. He won the discus event against Springfield with a toss of 162-9 1/2. That's far better than the best one at Ore-Cal, which was won by Mills of Klamath Falls at 154-1 1/2.

Smith Looking Ahead

Though this Richards looks dynamic, so does Smith. Smith, like Richards, won the discus as well as the shot. Smith took it in the B division with a toss of 143 1/2.

It may be quite a season for Smith, and he may be able to close the gap on Richards considerably before it is over.

Ore-Cal's Relays had some embarrassing points, too. Jim Tye of Bend won the B pole vault with a vault of 10-6. Amacker of Lakeview won C division with a vault of 13-3, and Brooks of Elkton won Class D with a vault of 11 feet.

Canyonville Bible Academy won the Class D shuttle hurdles in a time of 1:01.4. Ashland finished ahead of Bend to win Class B with a slower time of 1:02.3.

High Jump

Maurer of Prospect won the Class D high jump at 5-9 1/4. The Class B high jump was won at 5-9 1/4 by Nelson of Ashland. (Incidentally, the high jump is Bend's weakest event, as Coach Hoot Moore boasts nary a jumper. Moore hopes to develop one, however, before the season is out.)

Koufax, Dodgers smack Yankees in 5-1 go-around

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI)—It looked like a rerun of the 1963 World Series as hurling ace Sandy Koufax and the Los Angeles Dodgers clobbered the New York Yankees, 5-1, Monday night in a exhibition game before a record standing room only crowd.

Don Drysdale was scheduled to battle Whitey Ford on the mound today as the World Champion Dodgers try to make it two in a row over the Yankees at Vero Beach, Fla.

Koufax, who snapped his four-game losing streak with Monday night's victory, went six innings—allowing five scattered hits and striking out six, including Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris.

The Dodger star, who defeated the Yanks twice in the '63 World Series, allowed only one walk—in the sixth to Bobby Richardson—and it cost him a run when Mantle doubled to score the second baseman.

Joe Moeller pitched the last three innings, giving up only two singles to the Bombers.

Maurice Wills rapped a bases-loaded single off Bob Meyers in the fifth to give the Dodgers two runs and they added three more in the seventh. Meyers was the loser.

Dodger manager Walt Hult announced that Koufax will hurl the Dodgers' National League opener against the St. Louis Cardinals. Drysdale got the nod for the second game.

Giants hope season to be as good as training wars

PHOENIX (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants hoped today that the 1964 season would be just as successful as was their Arizona training campaign.

They closed out their Cactus League season Monday with a 9-7 win over the Chicago Cubs. Although the Giants won only two of seven from the Chicago squad, San Francisco's 21-7 spring mark was 4 1/2 games better than the record of the second-place Chicago team.

The Giants' 19-2 triumph of American League squads was the clincher of the Cactus League title. A crowd of 2,650 Monday gave the Giants 50,246 fans for 16 here, or a hike of about 14,000 over last year.

Willie Mays' one-man rampage put the Giants out in front 5-0 Monday, but Mays departed and the Cubs roared back.

Bob Hendley, obtained from Milwaukee in the big winter trade, went five sizzling innings before the Cubs battered him for four in the sixth. Bob Shaw, also obtained from the Braves, finished up in so-so style.

Mays whacked two doubles and a triple and scored three runs. He retired after five innings with a spring batting mark of .411. Coupled with Orlando Cepeda's .438 and Willie McCovey's .391, it appears the Giants' power brigade could produce even more hits, homers and runs this season than last.

Chicago had 12 hits to the Giants' 11.

Morrell Cray had three hits and Frank Peters and Doug Stahl each collected triples to pace a 14-hit Oregon State attack.

Oregon collected 15 hits with Dean leading the way with three safeties and Terry Leininger, Murphy, Gordon Avery and Dennis McCarter each getting two.

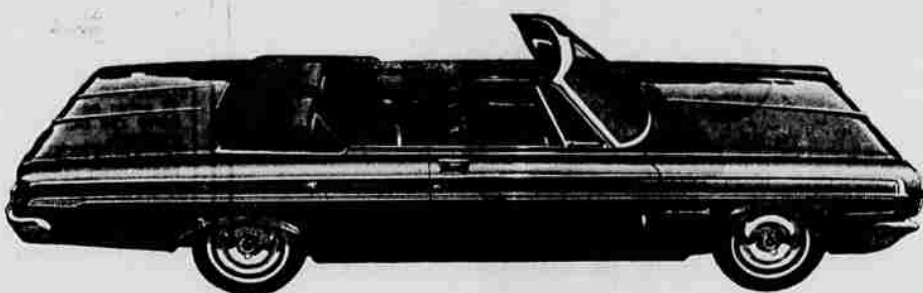
