

Gov. Rosellini rejects Wilson probation plea

OLYMPIA (UPI)— Gov. Albert D. Rosellini Tuesday flatly rejected Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield's suggestion that John Lyle Wilson could be placed on probation in Oregon.

Rosellini said such an arrangement would not be legal under Washington law.

Hatfield proposed the probation plan as a sort of compromise to solve the knotty problems surrounding Wilson who escaped seven years ago from Eastern Washington State Hospital.

Wilson had been transferred to the mental institution from the state penitentiary at Walla Walla where he was serving a sentence for second degree murder.

Rosellini said that under Washington law, a person convicted of second degree murder is not eligible for parole until he serves 7-12 years in prison. "I understand that Mr. Wilson has served 3 years, 10 months and 9 days," Rosellini said.

Wilson has been living and working in Portland under the name of Jim Ostrander for the past six years.

His employers and friends in Oregon have pleaded with officials of both states not to send him back to prison.

Wilson was sentenced to 30 years for taking part in a grocery holdup in Seattle in 1953 in which a man was killed.

Date picked for wind up of marathon

Thursday, April 30, has been set as the date of the final playoffs in the bridge marathon being sponsored by the Boys and Girls Aid Society auxiliary of Bend. It has been announced by co-chairmen Mrs. Ray LeBlanc and Mrs. Don Burd.

Play in the benefit marathon began last January. The playoffs will bring together for the first time all participants in the tournament. It will be held at the Elks Temple, beginning at 8 p.m., with members of the auxiliary as hostesses.

Prizes will be awarded at that time for highscores accumulated during the marathon. A \$50 grand prize will be awarded the couple with the high score for the tournament, with \$10 prizes going to high scorers in each group.

Players who will be unable to attend the playoff event may do one of two things, the co-chairmen have announced. Social Security payments totaled

Social security benefits in the amount of \$181 million were paid to Oregonians in 1963, Senator Neuberger reported, based on a report she had received from the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Oregonians numbering 213,861 were receiving social security benefits as of Dec. 31, 1963. 200,479 were receiving regular retirement or survivors benefits while 13,382 were receiving disability benefits. For the month of December, 1963, these benefits amounted to \$14 million, 816 thousand.

Deschutes County social security benefits were received by 3,121 persons as of Dec. 31, 1963. They received \$214,674. In Crook County, 888 persons received \$58,926, and in Jefferson, 583 persons were paid \$35,419.

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Public hearing on primitive area plan dated

A public hearing on a proposal to reclassify the Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area to Wild Area status will be held June 2 in Salem, it was announced from the Deschutes National Forest office in Bend today.

The hearing on the proposal to enlarge the 86,700-acre Primitive Area to a 96,944-acre Wild Area will be in the State Capitol, and will start at 9 a.m.

The Central Oregon Cascades area has been under study for reclassification since 1961. The Forest Service invited and received suggestions from groups and individuals before announcing its proposal last August. The proposal met with general public approval with the exception of three outdoor clubs which expressed dissatisfaction with the boundary at four points, where they believed additional land should be added to the Wild Area.

This made a public hearing necessary. J. Herbert Stone, regional forester, said the proposed adjustments are not a part of the Forest Service proposal for which general approval has been received from the public.

Information about the hearing can be obtained locally from the Deschutes National Forest office.

The Forest Service established the Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area in 1930 and enlarged it in 1933.

PORTLAND (UPI)— A Subversive Activities Control Board hearing, picketed peacefully Tuesday, continued today with extra police on duty to see that order was maintained.
