BSHS ready for primary on Thursday

Study of area soils is planned

A Central Oregon study of pumice and volcanic ash soils is to be undertaken this summer by two Oregon State College scientists under a \$21,400 grant from the National Science Foundation to support the work over a two-year period.

Three of five sites to be studied will be east of the Cascades.

The project will be undertaken primarily to provide a better understanding of use of pumice and volcanic ash soils, particularly in forestry. Dr. C. T. Youngberg and Dr. Moyle E. Harward will be in charge.

In Central Oregon, work will be concentrated on the public

area blanketed with ash from exploding Mt. Mazama some 7,500 years ago. Most of this area is south of Bend.

There are some 3½ million acres of pumice soils in the area, mostly forest lands. It is estimated that 50 per cent or more of the soils in the state are influenced by pumice and ash from ancient volcanoes.

Youngberg, a forest soils scientist, has been working on pumice soils in Central Oregon for nearly 10 years, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service and Weyerhaeuser Company.

His research has shown that the pumice soils have good potential for tree and crop growth if there is moisture.
