On program Saturday night IFYE student's trip 'down under' gave her better understanding of Australia

Learning another way of life by living it.

This is what 22-year-old Grace Elliott of Astoria did during the last five months as an International Farm Youth Exchange student to Australia. She is visiting Deschutes County this week telling her story of the 4-H sponsored program.

Miss Elliott will be featured with two other IFYE delegates Saturday night at a benefit chili feed for the program at the Bend High School cafeteria. All three will show slides and tell of their travel experiences. The program is being sponsored by the Empire Builders 4-H Club and is open to the general public.

Grace, who is a graduate of Portland State College, stayed with 12 different families during her trip which ended March 27. Miss Elliott found out that she had several misconceptions about Australia until she visited the country. For instance, she said, she had the idea that everyone owned an airplane so they could get around over the wide open spaces and that everyone went to horse races. "But it wasn't quite like that at all," she continued.

Grace said the country from "down under" could be just another part of the United States where people talked with a little different accent. "The people I came in contact with thought well of Americans, especially adults who had lived through the war," the Astoria girl said. Miss Elliott said she was very surprised that no one quizzed

her about America's racial problems while she was in Australia. In fact, she even asked one of her hosts why the subject had never been mentioned.

Special Alaska offering planned by Methodists

Methodist Church members Sunday will get a chance to contribute to disaster relief programs now underway in Alaska.

A special offering will be made Sunday. To provide a channel for aid to Alaska, the Council of Bishops and the Council of World Service and Finance have authorized an Alaska Earthquake Appeal. Methodist installations in the Anchorage area suffered only limited damage. Two buildings of the Alaska Methodist University survived the quake and are being used to house refugees.

Bishop A. Raymond Grant, Portland, who administers the Alaska Mission, has pointed out that hundreds of homeless are being cared for by Methodist and other church institutions in Anchorage.

Dr. Recter Johnson of the Turnigan Church in Anchorage, who was a guest pastor in Bend last summer, has announced that \$600,000 is needed to repair church and university properties there.

Eight indicted for cheating on federal returns

PORTLAND (UPI)—Eight inmates and former inmates of the Oregon State Penitentiary were indicted by a federal grand jury here Thursday on charges of cheating on their federal income tax returns.

They are accused of filing false claims for \$1,137.04 in refunds while engaged in a conspiracy that lasted from April, 1960, to July, 1962.

The alleged ringleader, safecracker Thomas R. Vorse, 37, was named as a co-conspirator but not as a defendant. He pleaded guilty to a similar charge earlier this year and drew an additional 60-day sentence. He is now serving a prison term in Washington.

Named as defendants Thursday were Dale Hetland, 31, Albany; his brother, Derald, 27; Dillon Bowers, 26; Kenneth Ziteck, 33; Michael C. Deering, 27; James F. Whitehead, 24; Richard Johnson, and Thomas P. Schram, 40.

Derald Hetland is a former professional boxer who fought 70 bouts under the name Sonny Hett. He was serving a three-year sentence for statutory rape.

Dale Hetland was serving a 10-year term for manslaughter. Bowers was serving seven years and Ziteck five years for burglary. Schram was serving 15 years for armed robbery, Johnson a forgery term, and Whitehead was convicted of burglary.

Deering, another convicted burglar, is now a mathematics teacher in McNeil Island Federal Prison in Washington.

The indictment charges the men simply claimed money was withheld from fictitious income and the Internal Revenue Service sent the refunds by check.

An Internal Revenue spokesman said Thursday the procedure for sending refunds has since been revised and special attention has been given to returns from prisons.

Work planned on road into Lava Cast forest

The Deschutes National Forest on May 5 will receive bids on a project which will complete the gravel surfacing of the road from U.S. Highway 97 into the Lava Cast forest, one of the top tourist attractions of the area.

Forest officials said the project calls for the surfacing of a 3.1 mile unit. This will be on the upper end of a road already surfaced a distance of about five miles.

This forest road into the Lava Cast forest swings to the north of Cinder Butte, near Camp Abbot. The first 5 mile unit was improved recently under terms of a timber sale.

Improvement of the new unit will eliminate a rugged section of the route in the high country.

Information relative to the new contract can be obtained either from the Bend Chamber of Commerce or from the Deschutes National Forest office in Bend.

Dr. Goldsmith speaks before cancer captains

Dr. Neal Goldsmith, medical director for the Deschutes County Unit of the American Cancer Society, spoke to Cancer Crusade captains at a training session recently at St. Charles Memorial Hospital. The training was in preparation for the local fund drive, Monday and Tuesday, April 13 and 14.

"Thirty doctors are familiar with what you are doing," he told the volunteer captains, "and appreciate greatly the time and effort you put into Cancer Crusade work." The American Cancer Society pays part of the salary of a clerical worker who assists with the local tumor registry. This is part of a follow-up on persons who have had cancer. It is continued until the doctor feels the person is cured of the disease.

Dr. Goldsmith was recently appointed by Dr. Bradford Pease, District No. 5 medical director.

The film, "All About April," was shown by John Harpole, District 5 lay director. It was shown that one cancer patient in three is saved today, but that medical science has the know-how to save one in two, without making a single new research discovery. The needless cancer deaths could be prevented, it was pointed out, if people would get to their doctors in time for prompt and proper treatment.

Mental health chairman due here on Monday

Dr. Gertrude Boyd Crane, mental health chairman of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, will be in Bend Monday evening, April 13 under the sponsorship of the four Bend PTA's, to speak to all parents on the general subject of family responsibility.

Dr. Crane, a retired professor of religion from Pacific University, delivered the keynote speech, "Focus on Family Responsibility," at the 1963 PTA convention in Eugene.

Returning delegates requested Bend's PTA Coordinating Committee to sponsor a meeting where Dr. Crane might present her vital message, the necessity of promoting stronger, finer, deeper relationships, to a local audience.

All parents are invited to attend the meeting which will start at 8 p.m. in the Kenwood gymnasium on Newport Avenue in Bend.

Mark delights crowd at mock GOP convention

GRINNELL, Iowa (UPI)—Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield delighted an enthusiastic crowd of Young Republicans at Grinnell Thursday night with his keynote address at a mock GOP convention.

The Republican governor lashed out at the Johnson Administration and the John Birch Society and called on Republicans to "mobilize all institutions and organizations to eliminate discrimination" through a strong civil rights program.

Hatfield charged the administration with creating a "something-for-nothing philosophy" by "promoting public programs which lead to dependency of citizens on the government rather than on liberating creative skills and abilities."

Earlier, Hatfield told an impromptu news conference with students and newsmen that the unexpected showing Alabama Gov. George Wallace made in the Wisconsin presidential primary illustrated that "prejudice is not an exclusive feature of the south."

Hatfield refused to make a prediction on the Oregon primary outcome, but said "it appears that Henry Cabot Lodge is gaining lots of support in Oregon."

Hatfield drew a bolsterous round of laughter and applause in his speech when he said members of the John Birch society "would be better off if they went back under the moldy old rocks from which they came." He said extremists "either left or right-winged, Republican or Democrat" were dangerous because "they do violence to the American concept of life and liberty."

Dedication set for new church

MADRAS — Dedication ceremonies for the new \$150,000 First Christian Church building in Madras are scheduled for Sunday afternoon, April 12, it was announced by the Rev. Jack Naff, pastor of the church.

Placing of the corner stone is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. and will be followed by dedicatory services in the main sanctuary at 3 p.m. Dr. George Reeves, minister of the First Christian Church in Corvallis will be the featured speaker.

Located at 755 C. Street, the new building provides a main sanctuary seating 400 persons, 19 classrooms for church school classes, a fellowship hall for social gatherings and the church office.

A cross topped steeple is a prominent feature of the exterior view of the building. Redwood and cedar are interior decorative features of the frame building then encompasses some 15,000 square feet of floor space.
