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Winter returns to Cascades

Winter returned to the Central Oregon Cascades last night and still lingered over the high mountain passes this morning, with flurries reported. The night fall of snow on the Government Camp, Santiam and Willamette Passes was light, about an inch.

Oregon State Police reported this morning that traffic was moving over the divides without trouble, although light, packed snow covered the Santiam. At Government Camp, the road was bare. There were spots of ice on the Willamette.

A rain storm straddled the northern part of Central Oregon Thursday evening, dropping 0.14 of an inch of moisture in Redmond, but yielding only a scant trace in Bend. There was considerable rain just to the east of Bend in the evening.

Scattered showers were forecast for Central Oregon tonight, with variable clouds expected. Cool weather is expected tonight, with a low around 22 predicted for the Bend area. Saturday temperatures will be mild, in the 55-60 degree range, the forecast indicates.

Snow flurries are predicted tonight for mountainous areas in the far eastern part of the state, with showers predicted for the Portland area.
