

Buddy Werner killed in French giant avalanche

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland (UPI)—Wallace (Bud) Werner was the world's most daring alpine skier.

This devil-may-care attitude cost the 29-year-old, freckle-faced racer from Steamboat Springs, Colo., several medals and a broken leg in the last three winter Olympics.

And Sunday it cost him his life on the Val Salver slopes near this famed resort.

Werner, who had retired from competitive skiing only last month, and Barbi Henneberger, 23, West Germany's ladies alpine champion, were killed when an avalanche buried them in eight feet of snow.

Twelve other international skiers who were in the same group with Werner and Miss Henneberger making location shots for a ski fashion movie escaped by "riding" the sliding snow.

Died of Shock

A rescue spokesman said Werner died from shock and Miss Henneberger from suffocation.

Despite broadcast warnings from the Swiss Institute of Snow Research that the avalanche danger was great in the area, Werner and his associates left for the Val Salver slopes early Sunday morning.

"We wanted to make some spectacular shots skiing on a slope covered by firm (a grainy spring snow)," said Fritz Wagnerberger, one of the German members of the group.

"The slope did not look dangerous. At 7 a.m., the whole snow blanket suddenly started sliding down—probably because of the weight of the whole group. All of us were tumbling down with the snow. Then the awful thing happened. The snow also started sliding down from the opposite slope."

"Except for Buddy and Barbi all of us managed to ride the avalanche out (stay on top), but Buddy and Barbi were buried by the snow coming down from the opposite direction. It was horrible. We left soon afterwards because we couldn't help them anymore."

Won in Olympics

Werner won every major U.S. and North American championship worth winning in the past decade but never was able to collect an Olympic medal.

The chunky daredevil competed in his first Olympics as a teen-ager at Cortina, Italy, in 1956 and broke into tears when he failed to finish among the leaders. He was America's top hope for the 1960 Olympics at Squaw Valley, Calif., but suffered a fractured leg in training.

In this year's Olympics at Innsbruck, Austria, Werner again was dogged by bad luck. He fell during the giant slalom, finished eighth in the special slalom and wound up 17th in the downhill—his specialty.

Exhibitions reveal

Giants, Twins may finish up in 1964 World Series

It will be the San Francisco Giants and the Minnesota Twins in the 1964 World Series if the final standings of the spring exhibition schedule bear any relation to the reality of a 162-game season—which they usually don't.

The Giants, on the eve of the opening of the regular season, easily outdistanced all major league clubs with a 24-7 record in the combined Grapefruit-Cactus league standings after winding up their spring campaign with a 7-6 victory over the

Cleveland Indians Sunday.

The Twins topped the American League teams with a 15-9 mark. In fact, only one other AL team—the Baltimore Orioles at 14-11—played better than .500 ball. The Los Angeles Angels finished at an even .500 percentage with 10 wins in 20 games while every other junior league club—including the New York Yankees—wallowed below the break-even mark.

The National League was almost a complete reversal with seven teams keeping their heads above water while only three clubs—led by the regressive New York Mets—accumulated more losses than wins.

The Milwaukee Braves were second to the Giants in the senior circuit. The Braves were 18-6, followed by the Chicago Cubs, St. Louis Cardinals and Pittsburgh Pirates in that order. The Mets, as is their custom, were last in the National League at 10-17.

The Yankees and world champion Los Angeles Dodgers were far from world beaters and both ended their spring schedules in inglorious fashion Sunday.

The American League champions, who wound up fifth in league standings with a 12-15 record, bowed 3-2 to their Richmond farm team while the Dodgers, whose 9-15 mark was good enough for ninth in the National League, were humbled by the Angels, 5-0, to lose the mythical Los Angeles City championship for the third straight year.

The booby prize of the spring belongs to the Boston Red Sox, who were the most ineffective team of the spring with a horrendous 8-22 record although the Cleveland Indians made it a race, closing at 9-22.

Giardello-Rivero non-title bout Friday night heads boxing slate

NEW YORK (UPI)—A non-title fight between middleweight champion Joey Giardello and Argentina's Rocky Rivero at Cleveland Friday night features this week's slim boxing schedule.

It will be Giardello's first ring appearance since he won the 160-pound crown from Dick Tiger at Atlantic City, N.J., last December. The bout will be televised nationally (ABC-TV).

Rivero is the leading kayo artist in boxing today. The rugged Argentine has scored 36 knockouts while winning 41 of 52 pro bouts. Giardello also is no slouch as a puncher, stopping 32 opponents while winning 94 of 125 fights.

Both fighters have agreed to make a contract weight of 165 pounds or less.

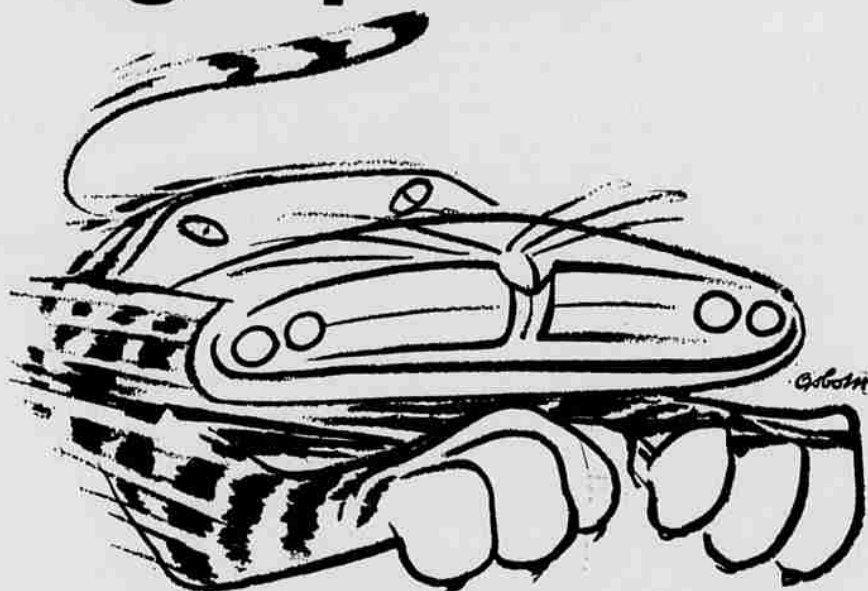
The victories left the Ducks with a 14-4 record for the season.
