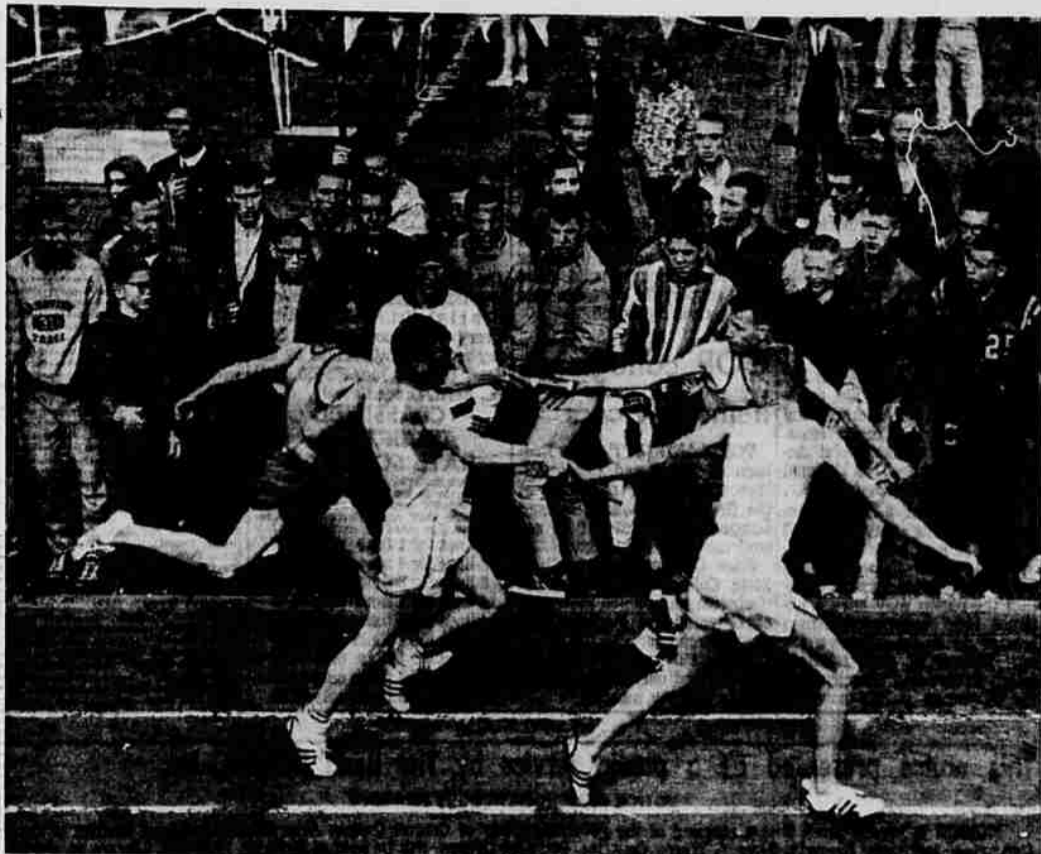


Lava Bears take Elks Cinderama, Redmond 2nd

Frisco, Hawks tied up at 3-all

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The St. Louis Hawks and the San Francisco Warriors are deadlocked three games apiece today in the Western Division National Basketball Association playoffs following the Hawks 123-94 win Sunday night.

The Hawks will meet the Warriors in the final game of the best-of-seven series Thursday night at San Francisco.

Hawks Coach Harry Gallatin expressed some optimism after the victory. "If we keep running and play tough defense like we did tonight we should go all the way," he said.

"Our over-all defensive job was the best it has been in the series and as a result they were forced to shoot from outside and the ball wasn't falling in," Gallatin said.

Masters king Palmer looks to US Open

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—King Arnold Palmer, back on his throne after six months in virtual exile, set his sights today on the U.S. Open — second stop en route to the grand slam of golf.

Palmer, who became the first-ever four-time Masters champion when he beat defending champion Jack Nicklaus and Texan Dave Marr by six strokes, said he would sidestep the pro tour for the next two weeks and use some of that time to practice on the Congressional course in Washington where this year's Open is to be held.

He made it clear that he hopes this might be the year in which he can sweep the big four — the Masters, the U.S. Open, the PGA and the British Open. This is one of the few feats which has escaped him in a fabulous 10-year career that includes 41 tour victories and more than a half million dollars in prize money.

"If I win the U.S. Open, then I definitely will go after the British title," Palmer said. "I'm reasonably sure that I'll be in the British Open under any circumstances and I'll definitely play in the PGA."

Palmer wiped out any doubts about his status at the top of the golf heap Sunday when he posted a final round 70 for a 12-under-par 276 total to earn \$20,000 and come within two strokes of the tournament record set by Ben Hogan back in 1953.

Bend comes back, wins 2 from Buff nine, 4-1, 6-5

MADRAS — Bend bounced back from a double shellacking Friday night at the hands of the loop-leading The Dalles Indians and did in Madras twice Saturday night, 4-1 and 6-5.

Bend High School's Lava Bears led most of the way through both contests against the hometown Madras nine.

In the opener, both teams got all their runs in the first inning. Bend came to bat first and pushed four across the plate on singles by Neil McGinnis and Benny Hamilton.

Rod Pitcher and Dave Warrenburg were walked by a tosser Larry Barnes to help the Bend cause. In the frame's bottom half, Madras came right back with a tally of its own. Vinson Couch slammed a double to left and scored on a Bend infield bobbie off the bat of Madras' Steve Summers.

Both teams went tally-less for the rest of the contest. In the nightcap, Bend led all the way. The Bruins of Coach Bill Bauer scored long runs in the first, second and seventh innings, and came on with a three run explosion in the fifth.

Madras exploded for three itself in the sixth but it wasn't enough. Claude Smith went two for three for Madras as did Val Lewis for Bend. Dick Hollenbeck started on the mound but

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San Jose beats OSU thinclads

CORVALLIS (UPI)—San Jose State picked off 11 first places—two by sprinter Wayne Herman—to defeat Oregon State 80-65 in a dual track meet Saturday.

It was the Beavers' first loss in three two-way meets this season. Herman won the 100-yard dash in 9.9 and the 220 in 21.8. Tom Tuite led San Jose State to a 1-2-3 sweep in the two-mile run with an 8:58.9 meet record time and the Spartans finished 1-2 in the javelin, high jump and triple jump.

The only other double winner was the Beavers' Tom Wyatt—first in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles in 37.5 for a meet record and the 120 high hurdles in 14.6.

NCAA mile champion Morgan Groth of Oregon State dropped out with a leg injury while leading in the third lap of the mile run. Ben Tucker of San Jose State won the event in 4:13.5. The Beavers' Dale Story, a former NCAA cross country champion, dropped out after a mile in the two-mile run.

Also breaking meet records were San Jose State's Craig Fergus with 48.9 in the triple jump and Pat Kelso with 55-8 1/2 in the shot put and Oregon State's Lou Fasano with 170-2 1/2 in the discus.

Relay meet records fall in 440 relay, shot, broad jump

Bend High School's running Bears made it three wins in as many tries here Saturday afternoon as the Bruins turned under five visiting track squads in the third annual Elk's Cinderama Relays.

Coach Hoot Moore's thinclads scored 89 points while winning eight of the 11 events. Second place Redmond finished 40 points back with a total of 49 points.

Other teams finishes as Burns, third with 44 points; Madras, 32 points; Lakeview, 26, and Gilchrist, 20. Two other schools, Crook County and Henley, were scheduled to attend the meet but did not come.

Records Fall
A total of four meet records fell in spite of a cool, stiff wind that blew constantly throughout the afternoon.

Bend's 440 yard relay team of Jerry Rich, Dennis Pacheco, Bob Nosler and Craig Usher knocked two-tenths of a second off the old 140 mark of 45.5 seconds with a time of 45.3 seconds.

The Bruins also upped the mark in the shot put relay by almost 10 feet. The combined puts of Clyde Smith, Kirk Ward and Dan Stockdale measured 144 feet, 3/4 inch. The old record was 134' 11 3/4". Smith's toss of 55' 4" also set a new Bend High School record.

Redmond came up with a top effort in the broad jump relay. Denny Moore, Gary Wing and Don Lawson teamed up for a combined jump of 59' 11 3/4" to shatter the old mark of just over 57 feet.

Lakeview Vaulter Best
Tom Amacker, a senior from Lakeview High School got a hardy round of applause from a sparse crowd when he cleared the bar at 13 feet in the pole vault to break Bill Tye's record of 12' 3/4". Amacker's vault marked the third consecutive year that the pole vault record had been upped.

Kirk Ward became a repeat winner in the discus when he copped the blue ribbon in that event for a second consecutive year with a toss of 135' 1". The discus was one of the events that was hampered most by the wind.

Scoring in the relay events (all but the javelin, pole vault and discus) was on a 10-7-5-3-1 basis. The individual events were scored by the 5-4-3-2-1 method.

Next weekend will see Central Oregon track squads at Eugene's Hayward Field for the "state championship" of relay meets, the University of Oregon's Hayward Relays. About 25 schools in the 750-1250 student enrollment bracket will be shooting for Bend's Lava Bears who are the defending champions in the "Class A" division.
