TOKYO (UPI) — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon flew home today, after calling for a tough, uncompromising stand against Communist expansion in Asia.

Poll indicates Lodge threatens runaway win

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge is threatening to make a runaway of the Oregon GOP presidential primary on May 15, according to pollster Louis Harris.

The Harris poll, copyrighted by the Washington Post Co., showed Lodge was pulling away from his nearest presidential rival by a margin of nearly three to one among Republican voters in the state.

Harris said that Lodge was preferred by 46 per cent of "a carefully drawn cross-section" of Republicans most likely to vote in the primary.

Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon was far behind with only 17 per cent. Arizona Sen. Barry M. Goldwater was preferred by 14 per cent of the voters polled. New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller won the backing of 13 per cent. Pennsylvania Gov. William Scranton was preferred by 4 per cent.

Lodge, ambassador to South Vietnam, swamped both Goldwater and Rockefeller as a write-in candidate in the New Hampshire primary last month. Although he has not declared for the nomination, his name will be on the Oregon ballot.

Harris said his poll indicated Lodge "appears to be vulnerable to attack" on the Viet Nam issue, however.

The pollster said 63 per cent of GOP voters disapproved of the administration's handling of the war in South Vietnam and 84 per cent considered Lodge in some degree responsible for administration policy.

Harris said that when asked what candidates they could not vote for, 34 per cent named Goldwater, 28 per cent named Maine Sen. Margaret Chase Smith, 27 per cent named Rockefeller, 13 per cent named Nixon, 5 per cent named Scranton and 2 per cent named Lodge.

(In Oregon, a statewide poll by the independent research organization of Clark, Bardsley and Haslacher published by The Oregonian today showed President Johnson holds a lead over all Republicans he might face next November. The poll showed Henry Cabot Lodge the closest to Johnson with 29 per cent to 59 per cent for the President. Twelve per cent were undecided.)

Armed robbery charges faced

A 23-year-old Idaho resident has been arraigned in Deschutes County District Court for the armed robbery of the Standard Service Station, across from the Pilot Butte Inn, on April 1. He is Phillip Thomas Tomjack, of Jerome. Tomjack turned himself in at Eugene, and was brought to Deschutes County by sheriff's officers this past weekend.

Tomjack is held in lieu of \$2,000 bail. The charge on which he was arraigned is assault and robbery with a dangerous weapon.

Officers said that the service station attendant reported being robbed by a man who threatened him with a knife.

A court-appointed attorney is to be named for Tomjack, who claims, officers say, he got \$24 from the service station.

Wide range of topics eyed by forest recreation group

National Forest Recreation Association members in Bend Monday for an area meeting encompassing Region 6 of the U.S. Forest Service further evaluated their position in the realm of outdoor mountain recreation and discussed a wide range of problems.

The conference was held at Sambo's, where the group opened its meeting in the morning and continued into the afternoon, following a luncheon at which Frank H. Loggan, member of the Oregon State Highway Department travel division advisory group, was the speaker. He touched on the ever-increasing volume of tourists visiting the region.

Loan, deposit figures given

Statewide, the United States National Bank of Oregon marked up major increases in both loans and deposits over the comparable figures for the first three months of the present year.

In Redmond, deposits for the period ending March 31, 1964, were \$9,252,180 and loans and discounts were \$4,763,336. These compare with deposits of \$8,464,685 in the same period last year and loans for the 1963 period of \$3,743,351.

Deposits of the Bend branch in the quarter just ended aggregated \$9,996,031, and loans stood at \$7,786,818. These compare with deposits of \$9,264,382 in the same period in 1963, and loans of \$7,062,946.

The Madras branch reported deposits of \$7,896,817 for the first quarter of 1964, and loans of \$5,110,031. These figures compare with \$9,109,830 in deposits for the 1963 period and loans of \$4,356,756.

The Prineville branch, which opened on June 21, 1963, reported deposits of \$1,262,058 and loans of \$687,609.

As of March 31, U.S. National's statewide deposits stood at \$979,163,199, some \$43 million more than the reporting data of March 29, 1963, E. J. Kolar, president, reported.

Bauman loses damage action

PORTLAND (UPI) — A federal court jury has declined to award damages to a former Corvallis Volkswagen dealer who sued Riviera Motors of Portland for \$150,000.

Walter Bauman, now a Bend-area rancher, filed the suit after Riviera refused to renew his dealer's franchise. He held the franchise from May, 1955, through December, 1961.

Riviera Motors president Knute Qvale testified during the trial that Bauman's sales and service performance was not up to company standards.

Indians agree to join effort

RENO (UPI) — A high level pow-wow of 300 Indians from the Western states have agreed to join together to protect their rights when dealing with the federal government.

The informal conference, called by the United Paiutes Inc., discussed common problems facing the tribes and heard of the experience of California Indians who are now dealing with the government to terminate land holdings the Indians always considered theirs in perpetuity.

Melvin Thom of Schurz, Nev., president of the National Indian Youth Council said, "The American public generally is sympathetic with the Indian people but we have to deal with the hard bureaucracy."

He was referring to the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Clyde Warrior of the Ponca Tribe, Ponca, Okla., declared "Nobody in Washington ever thought to sit down and talk to Indians like people."

"They refer to us as a problem. That's wrong. What we have is a white man problem."

School budget quickly approved after only one person shows up for scheduled hearing Monday

A hearing on the 1964-65 budget for School District No. 1 last night failed as usual to generate much interest from district residents.

One man, who did not identify himself, commented that the budget was too high, but he added that there didn't seem to be much that could be done about it.

Only one other visitor attended the meeting — and he was there for another reason.

Therefore, lacking anyone with whom to discuss the budget, directors moved quickly to adopt it by a unanimous vote. It totals \$2,398,459.36 and calls for a levy of \$1,186,862.33.

A vote on the amount of the levy outside the six per cent limitation, the sum of \$602,244.82, will be taken at the annual school election on May 4.

Other Matters Considered

With the hearing out of the way, the board turned to a variety of other school matters, including several pertaining to the sale of the Allen School site and acquisition of a new building site in the Pilot Butte area.

Relative to purchase of the Pilot Butte building site from the State Highway Department, Alva C. Goodrich, attorney for the district, reported that he had been in touch with the Salem office of the highway department earlier in the day and had received assurance that a deed would be ready for signature at the school board's next meeting on April 27.

The property is being purchased from the state agency at a cost of \$15,000. The transaction also involves a trade of 10 acres of school-owned property in the area to the state.

Goodrich announced to the board that Gunnar Bjorvik and the heirs of the late Selma Selken are making a gift to the

district of a triangular piece of property, about a third of an acre in size, at the northwest corner of the site being acquired from the state.

Directors instructed the district clerk to express through a letter to the donors the board's pleasure at receiving the property without charge.

Seeks Access Road

Louis Hillis, a resident of Bend, discussed with the board the possibility of receiving from the district provision for an access road to a lot which he has purchased adjacent to the Pilot Butte site. He indicated that unless he is able to make arrangements for such a road he will be forced to abandon plans to build a home on the property.

The lot lies to the west of the school site. After studying maps of the area, board members decided to delay any action on the request by Hillis until an on-the-spot inspection of the area has been made.

Goodrich also reported on the results of a meeting last week with the Deschutes County Court at which a satisfactory arrangement was made for transfer of a reversionary clause from the Allen school property to property of equivalent value at Kingston School.

Completion of this transaction will give the school district clear title to the Allen site and will permit its sale for commercial purposes.

It was also reported by the attorney that the County Court is receptive to the transfer to the district of a 40-acre parcel of land in the Tumalo Creek area. It lies northwest of the road leading to Shevlin Park and will be used by the district for classes in conservation.

A resolution formally requesting the property was approved by the board.

The board received a visit from Dean Nichols of the county's Intermediate Education District. Nichols, who becomes county school superintendent on July 1, devoted most of his presentation to the status of the controversial county film library.

He noted that the library will be operated in the next school year, but said that no new purchases of film will be made. The library, he said, will in effect be kept in a state of suspension until a final determination is made regarding the feasibility of continuing the program. Results of a state study of the situation now being made will be ready in the fall, he added.

Board hires 11 teachers, accepts eight resignations

Directors of School District No. 1 last night accepted resignations from eight teachers and approved contracts for eleven new teachers.

Among those resigning was Lloyd M. Gabriel, assistant principal at the senior high school, who will do graduate work next year at Stanford University.

On recommendation of Superintendent R. E. Jewell, the board named Larry Dale, present guidance director at BSHS, to the vacancy.

Other teachers resigning at the end of the present school year are John W. Barton, Larry E. Hibbert, Don McAfee, Robert K. Todd, Jack D. Ward, Miss Myrtle Lilla and Mrs. Margaret Winbigler.
