REDMOND — One of Redmond's largest and finest homes during the city's early days was consumed by flames earlier this week, but it was a planned blaze, well under control during the two-hour burning. The house stood on the corner of Fifth and Cascade.

Constructed by an early-day grocer, C. R. McLellan, in the era when there were very few two-story homes in Redmond, the burning was authorized by a modern-day grocer, Ned Fields, who will use the site for a parking lot adjacent to his new Erickson's Super Market, now under construction on Sixth and Black Butte.

Fields donated the house to the Redmond Fire Department for use in what proved to be an "invaluable" fire-fighting practice, according to Fire Chief Hollis Titus.

In charge of the project was Assistant Chief Russell Washburn, who is fire training instructor for Central Oregon College. Washburn said the firemen could put what they learned to good use for many years, probably saving "thousands of dollars in property." They were able to test and practice with fogging equipment and try various techniques of fire fighting.

The building was burned from the top down, drawing a huge crowd of spectators and causing several, who were unaware of the plan, to remark that the "firemen are doing a mighty poor job of putting out that fire."

Several volunteers stood by until late in the night to make sure the last bit of timbers had burned to cinders.

Judge refuses woman damages in sight case

EUGENE (UPI) — A judge Wednesday refused to award damages to a woman who contended she lost her sight because a doctor administered the drug Chloroquine for treatment of arthritis.

Mrs. Dorothy Cochran, Cottage Grove, had filed a \$400,000 damage suit against Eugene physician Dr. James Brooke, his partners in the Eugene Hospital and Clinic, and Sterling Drug Co. of New York, manufacturer of the drug.

Lane County Circuit Judge Edward Leavy handed down the decision after dismissing the jury earlier in the final day of the nine-day trial. The jury was dismissed after attorneys for both sides entered motions for a directed verdict.

Damages denied in vaccine suit

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Charles Pfizer Co. emerged winner Wednesday in what is believed the first court suit in this country against Sabin oral vaccine.

A Circuit Court jury denied damages to Dan J. Ferguson, 41, Portland, a former insurance salesman, who said he contracted polio after taking Type III Sabin oral vaccine.

Ferguson had sought \$514,500. His attorneys said they would consider an appeal.

The jury deliberated about 1 1/2 hours. The trial lasted 2 1/2 weeks.

Circuit Judge Virgil Langtry told the jury, that it must find "proximate, or direct evidence" that Ferguson contracted polio as a result of taking the vaccine.

"You must not allow bias, sympathy or prejudice to play a part in your decision," the judge said.

Ferguson's attorney said in his closing argument his client had lost most use of both legs and would wear a brace the rest of his life.

The defense contended Ferguson had an ailment other than polio, and that if he did have polio it was coincidental to taking the vaccine and not as a result of it. It also said the Pfizer firm was not liable because it was not negligent in producing the vaccine.

Employment service, college set training program for waitresses

For the sixth year, and at the request of local restaurant owners, the Bend office of Oregon State Employment Service and Central Oregon College are co-operating in a waitress training and placement program.

Three sessions of a 15-hour training course will be held in Bend, with classes to meet in the faculty lounge at Bend High School. Mrs. Orval Barfknecht, director of the food services program in the Bend Public Schools, will be the instructor.

All persons 16 years of age and over, interested in the course, are asked to contact the local high school and register at the first meeting. A \$5 registration fee includes the cost of the text. This is to be paid at the first meeting.

The training will be in connection with a job placement program, in anticipation of a larger than usual demand for waitresses this summer, because of the ever-increasing tourist business in the Central Oregon area. Restaurant owners are urged to let the Employment Service know of their labor needs, including the waitress trainees, within the next two or three weeks.
