

Rocky proposes aid program for education

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Encouraged by a legislative success in his home state, Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York took to the campaign trail in Oregon again today and called for a three-point program of federal aid to education.

In remarks prepared for delivery at Oregon State University, Rockefeller said "increased efforts on the part of the federal government, the states, communities and private philanthropy" were needed to meet the higher education challenge.

Rockefeller arrived here at 8:33 a.m. PST and had a private breakfast with three newspaper publishers before addressing Oregon State students.

He flew here from New York where a special session of the legislature late Thursday approved revisions of the state's liquor laws.

Rockefeller was critical of Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, also a candidate in the May 15 Oregon Republican presidential primary. He said "Goldwater has stated on the floor of the Senate that he was opposed to any form of federal aid for education."

"Goldwater voted against the Eisenhower Administration's National Defense Education Act in 1950," Rockefeller said, "and just four months ago he voted against the higher education facilities act."

"I disagree with these positions taken by Sen. Goldwater which oppose essential programs that must be made in higher education for the good of the entire nation," Rockefeller said.

Points Outlined
The New York governor said the federal government should:

- Expand the student loan and graduate fellowships programs of the National Defense Education Act.
- Establish a new limited federal scholarship program based on ability and need.
- Extend the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 to make liberal arts construction facilities eligible for aid.

He cited the need for "unprecedented numbers of college and university trained personnel, particularly in the science, health and teaching professions."

It was Rockefeller's third trip to Oregon to bid for the state's 18 Republican national convention votes, but he faced a formidable task.

Polls published in the past week show Rockefeller trailing South Vietnam Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, write-in victory of the New Hampshire primary.

An Oregon drive also is forthcoming to seek support for former Vice President Richard Nixon, who won the Oregon presidential primary four years ago and carried the state in the 1960 general election.

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Public invited to annual Homemakers' Fair April 23

"Helping People to Help Themselves," the philosophy behind the Extension Service, will be expressed in exhibits at the annual Homemakers' Fair, April 23. It will be held at the National Guard Armory in Redmond from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., with the public invited to attend.

Besides exhibits by all 24 of the Deschutes county extension units, there will be a continuous program of entertainment—serious, funny or educational—in a special room, and a display corner where women may exhibit crafts or housekeeping aids they learned in the extension program.

The extension unit women will have luncheon at noon in the American Legion Building, served by the American Legion Auxiliary of Redmond.

There are now some 550 women in extension work in the county. There are 11 units in the Bend area, six in the Redmond area and one each in

Sisters, LaPine, Alfalfa, Cloverdale, Tumalo, Pleasant Ridge and Eastern Star. The LaPine unit has the largest membership, with 35 women participating.

Each unit meets once a month, from September through May, for a study of projects that will be helpful to the members as homemakers. Subjects covered this year were "A Will of Your Own," "A Study of Home Economics in Sweden," "Table Decorations," "Window Treatments," "Better Baking and Broiling," "Buying Foods Wisely" and "Twelve Days of Christmas," a management program for the holidays.

As a special interest project, most of the units have also taken a Civil Defense course of home preparedness, a series of 12 lessons. Furniture refinishing workshops were held in Bend and Redmond, and a night upholstery workshop is being held in Redmond.

Exhibits at the fair will be provided by the various units as follows:

Alfalfa, Associated Country Women of the World; Bend, gift wrapping; Boyd Acres, hand-made chrysanthemums for table decorations; Cascade, a patio cooker; Cinder Butte, first aid; Cloverdale, better baking and broiling; Eastern Star, flowers and shrubs.

Glen Vista, knitting; Juniper and Sage, table settings; LaPine, making roses for table decorations; Lava, "Know Your Sewing Machine"; Manzanita, healthful living in emergencies; Needles and Pines, sweet rolls; Nite-Away, exploring the spice shelf; Pine Cone, dried arrangements.

Pleasant Ridge, furniture refinishing; Pleasant Valley, egg shell plates; Redmond, secret sales; Sage and Sand, cake decorating; Six Corners, rug cleaning; Tall Pines, bug warfare and pest control; Terrebonne, soaps and detergents; Tumalo, Sweden; Tumbleweed, kitchen storage.
