Belgian doctor strike at end

BRUSSELS (UPI) — Belgium's 10,000 doctors ended an 18-day strike early today when the government agreed to halt its medical "draft" and to discuss changes in the controversial state insurance law.

The midnight agreement was expected to end the crisis which had deprived Belgium of all but emergency medical service. Premier Theo Lefevre said he hoped the situation would be "back to normal in 48 hours."

Belgian authorities had investigated eight deaths as possibly caused by the strike, and two doctors in Turnhout were arrested in connection with the death of an 18-month-old boy. Two doctors and a hospital technician were arrested here Friday on charges of sabotaging X-ray equipment.

The medical association notified its members of the end of the walkout, but instructed doctors on emergency duty to remain at their posts until they are notified other physicians are back at work.

Dr. Roger Thone, president of the medical association, said about 1,250 doctors who moved from Belgium into neighboring countries to wait out the strike "will return immediately."

REDMOND — Memorial services for Mrs. Bertha Denton, 85, who died April 6 in Formosa, will be held Sunday at 2 p.m. in the Community Presbyterian Church, with the Rev. James K. Egly officiating.

Mrs. Denton's son, Nick Denton of San Rafael, Calif., will come to Redmond for the services. Remains were cremated in Taiwan and the ashes were sent to Travis Air Force Base.

Born Jan. 1, 1879, in Dubuque, Iowa, she attended the University of Iowa and University of Washington. A public health nurse in Ashland for 20 years, she came to Redmond in 1942 to be near her sons, John and Nick. She had traveled extensively during the past ten years. She spent two years in Athens, Greece, a year in South America and was a public health nurse for the government for two years in Australia. She was teaching at the University of Tokyo when she was 80 years old.

Aside from her sons, she is survived by four grandchildren. Her husband, William Denton, died in 1924.

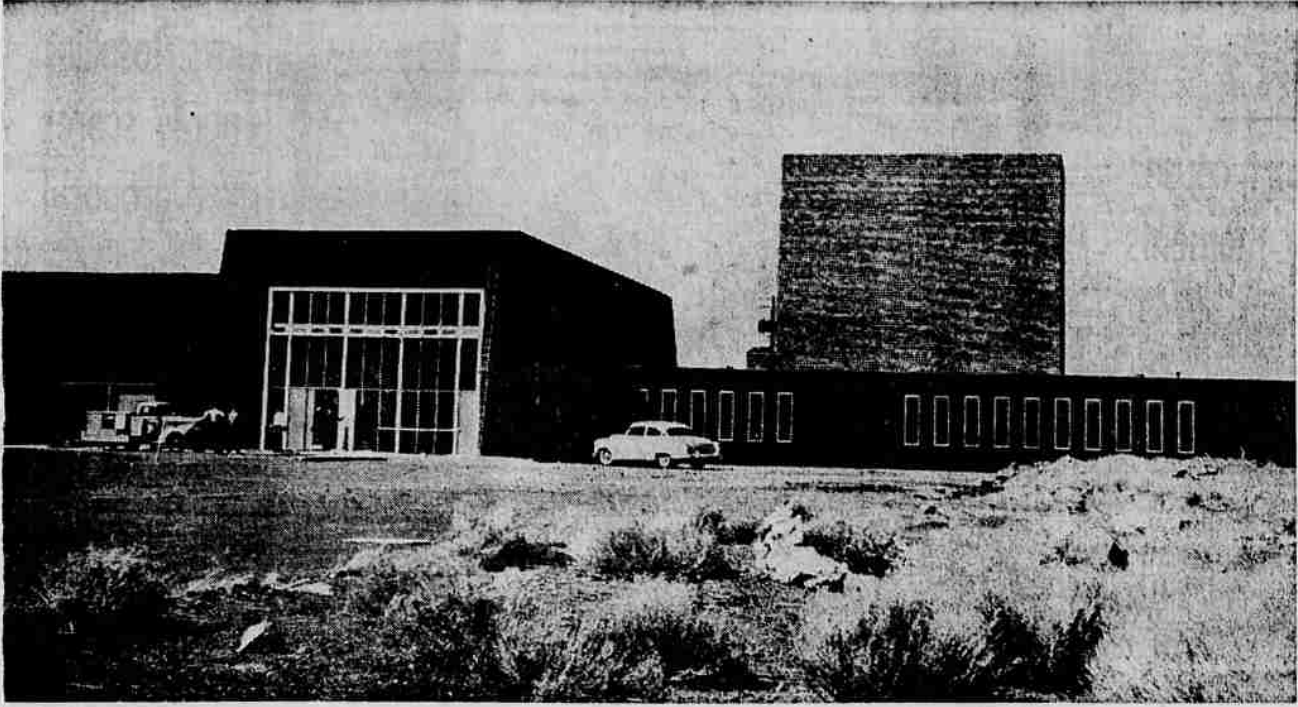

Speaker raps some popular behavior beliefs

Dr. Camilla Anderson, author-psychoanalyst and head of the out-patient department at the Oregon State Hospital, shot the ground out from under some of the popular beliefs about human behavior, in a talk Friday night.

She was speaker at a meeting sponsored by the Central Oregon Mental Health Association, at St. Alban's Church in Redmond.

"Happiness is the goal of most parents for their children," Dr. Anderson said. "We walk a chalk-line constantly, trying to give all the security, all the love, all the assurance of importance that we can — and most of us are raising monsters."

The speaker said that the grandiose self-image, not rejection feelings, is the prime cause of stress systems. This starts by being the center of things, from the cradle on, and can lead to psychological troubles, he said.

The stress feelings of life are motivated by guilt, resentment or helplessness, she said, adding that helplessness may take the form of impotent rage or depression. She said that psychiatry is actually a practice of fashioned common sense, when it all boils down, and warned that in this high-speed society, everyone needs to hang on to all the "marbles" he has.

Major causes of "lack of morals," she said, are old age, alcohol, mental deficiency and brain damage. Brain damage is often caused by pre-natal conditions, she said, and mentioned such factors as toxemia, prematurity and hemorrhage.

We behave as we do, Dr. Anderson said, because of the nature of our nervous systems, and the area of our beliefs. Because of drilled-in prejudices about right and wrong behavior, and what the consequences of both should be, we find ourselves with a "fantastic array" of beliefs, she said.

Preceding the talk, the association elected officers. The following were named: Dr. Evan Jones, Prineville, and Mrs. Maurice Roberts, Redmond, vice-presidents; Mrs. Ivan Huntley, Prineville, secretary, and Miss Carrie Scott, Bend, treasurer. Dr. J. E. Hyatt, Bend, is the president.

Author Hecht dead at age 70

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ben Hecht, 70, whose career as journalist, playwright and screenwriter spanned half a century, died early today in his Manhattan apartment.

Police attributed death to a heart attack.

Hecht's career began in his native Chicago in 1910 when he obtained a part-time job with the old Chicago Journal. From there he went to the Chicago Daily News and chronicled activities of the Windy City until the mid-1920's.

His achievements included the long-running play, "The Front Page," which later was made into a motion picture.

Hecht declined a college education to concentrate on his first love, newspapers. A prolific writer, his screen credits included "Spellbound," "Notorious," "Scarface," "Gunga Din," "Wuthering Heights," "The Scoundrel" and "Angels Over Broadway."

"It takes time to get the kind of government assistance Alaska needs," he said.

Growers worry about crops

Fruit growers worried about their budding crops today as nighttime temperatures continued to plunge below the freezing mark in Oregon.

Both sides of the Cascades reported below-freezing readings early today. Redmond in Central Oregon was the coldest, with 11 above. This also was the coldest reading reported in the United States, outside of Alaska, early today.

In the fruit growing areas of Medford and The Dalles-Hood River, the mercury also was down enough to cause orchardists to haul out the smudge pots. Medford had a low of 28 and The Dalles 32.

Agriculture specialists said it was too early to assess amount of damage but that it could be considerable in unheated orchards.

Lows of 28-38 in Eastern Oregon and 30-40 in Western Oregon were predicted tonight.

Sweeping study of draft ordered

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson announced today he has ordered a sweeping study of the Selective Service system with a view toward possibly filling military ranks on an entirely voluntary basis in the next decade.

The President made the announcement at an impromptu news conference — his second question and answer meeting with reporters in three days.

He said the Defense Department and other agencies concerned would conduct a "very comprehensive study" of the draft system and other military manpower policies.

He said the study would "deal with trends" pointing toward the 1970's and looking forward to "possibly meeting requirements on an entirely voluntary basis in the next decade."

Trademark suit filed in court

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)—The nation isn't big enough for A.J. Wiss & Sons Co. and a Gee Whiz Tool Corp., both selling the same type of products, according to a trademark infringement suit filed in federal court Thursday.

The Wiss firm of Newark, N.J., asked that the Gee Whiz firm of Memphis change its name to end public confusion. Both firms sell shears, snips and clippers.

NICKEL DOES JOB

BISMARCK, N.D. (UPI) — The Internal Revenue Service office reported Friday that a Williston, N.D., taxpayer managed to mail his income tax return in on time despite the lack of a stamp.

The taxpayer simply taped a nickel to the envelope and dropped it in a mail box in time to be postmarked before the Wednesday midnight deadline. Postal employees stamped the cancellation over the five cent piece.

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Rocky flies to California, may meet with Eisenhower

PORTLAND (UPI)—Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York flew to California for a weekend of rest and a possible meeting with former President Dwight D. Eisenhower today after a strenuous day of campaigning for Oregon's May 15 primary.

Rockefeller left here at 8:30 a.m. and was due in Palm Springs three hours later.

He capped his third foray into Oregon Friday night with a keynote address to a mock GOP convention at Sunset High School.

The Republican presidential candidate was to spend the weekend as a guest at the home of industrialist Leonard K. Firestone.

Eisenhower is spending the winter at a resort near Palm Springs.

Rockefeller's press secretary, Robert McManus, said "I don't know what Rocky's plans are," when asked if the New York governor would visit the former President.

Rockefeller was given a thunderous ovation by the 1,000 student delegates and 2,600 spectators, most of whom were adults, at Sunset High School Friday night.

During a question and answer period after keynoting the convention, Rockefeller drew a round of laughter and applause.

Wilderness area conflicts noted

PORTLAND (UPI) — An increase in conflicts between various types of recreationists using wilderness areas was cited today by J. Herbert Stone, regional U.S. forester.

Stone addressed a wilderness meeting sponsored by the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs.

"Ironical as it may seem," he said, "it is becoming increasingly apparent that the more complex conflicts will be those stemming from a clash in the interest of different types of recreation users."

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Three suspects quizzed, freed in death case

LAWRENCEVILLE, Ga. (UPI)—Three suspects picked up in Florida in connection with the slaying of three Georgia policemen were released today after authorities decided they were not connected with the killings.

The suspects had been taken into custody early today at Carabelle, Fla., on the request of Gwinnett (Lawrenceville) County Police Chief J. O. Bell.

"We learned that a car from Gwinnett County was down in Florida and the three men who were in it were acting suspicious," Bell said in explaining why he had the three picked up.

Later the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) announced the three had been released.

A GBI spokesman said it was determined that the three went to Florida to sell an old model car they had purchased in the Atlanta area.

Authorities said they have questioned about 40 persons since the slayings were first discovered Friday.

State, county and Atlanta police joined in a massive investigation to solve the murders of officers Jerry R. Everett, 28; Ralph K. Davis, 49, and Marvin Jesse Gravitt, 52.

The officers were shot sometime after answering a 1:15 a.m. complaint Friday concerning two suspicious cars which had met on a dirt road about a mile from the Northeast Expressway which runs into the Atlanta metropolitan area.

Everett and Davis were taking Gravitt, who had become ill, home in a patrol car when they were told by radio to investigate the cars.

The officers apparently died without a struggle. Two of the slain policemen were still wearing their caps when the bodies were found. Their holsters were empty.

Their patrol car—its radio, siren and blinker lights missing—was found parked off the dirt road a quarter mile from the death scene.

Accidents take lives of three

Raymond Nelson, 21, and Russell Harpole, 20, both of Junction City, were fatally injured in a two-car, head-on collision on State Highway 223 four miles south of Junction City. They died at a Eugene hospital.

Oscar Berg, 78, Philomath, died when his car was struck by a Southern Pacific freight train at a crossing on U.S. Highway 99W one mile south of Rickreall.
