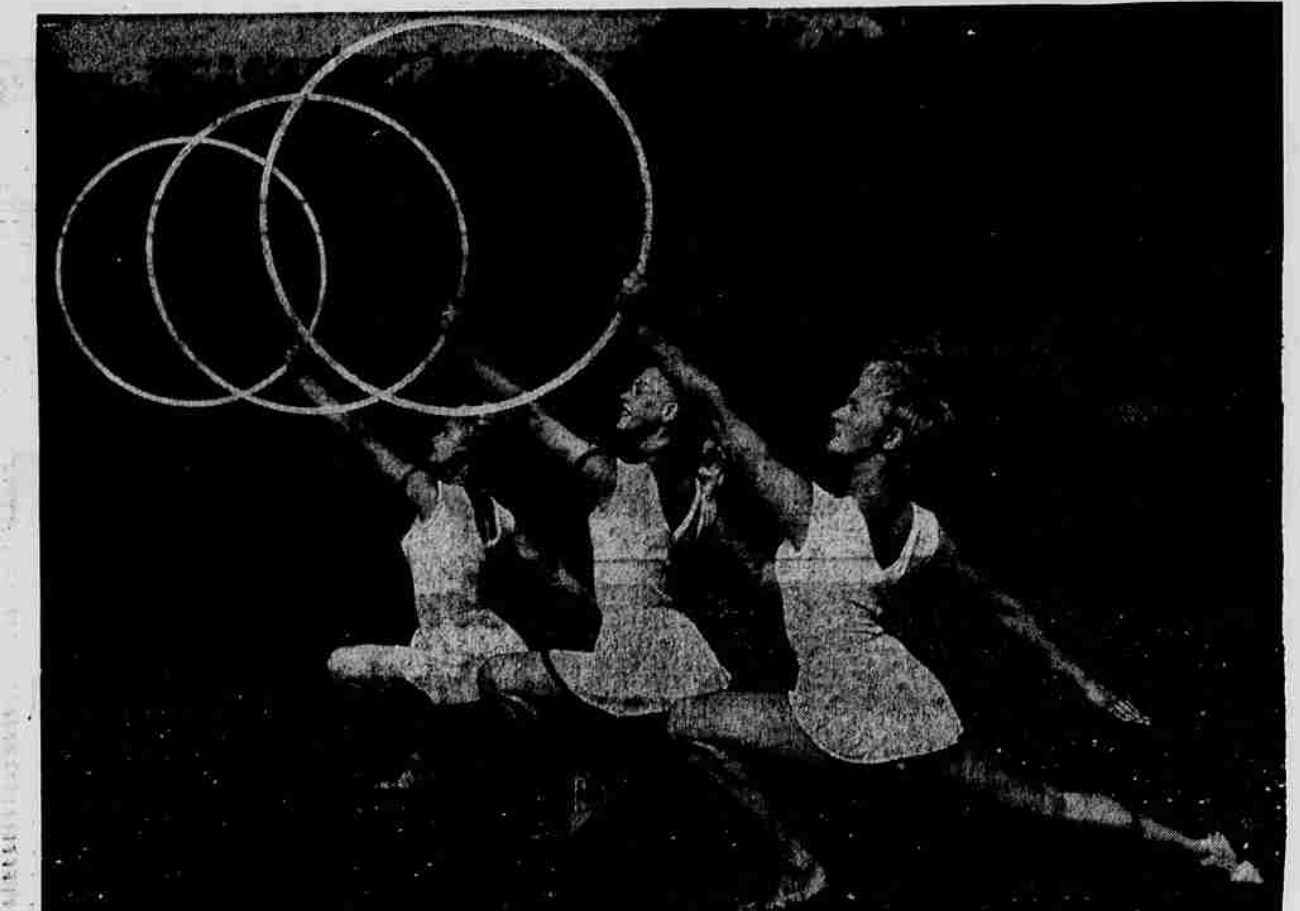

Young Demos urge yes vote on bond issue

Executive committee members of the Young Democrats of Oregon, meeting at the courthouse in Bend Sunday, urged a "yes" vote on State Ballot No. 1 at the May 15 primary. This is the \$30,000,000 bond issue for higher education with the first \$5,000,000 earmarked for community colleges.
 In other action, the YD's voted pre-primary endorsement for Norman Stoll, Portland, for Democratic National Committee member, and Robert Straub, Eugene, candidate for state treasurer. Stoll is the present national committeeman and Straub is a former state Democratic party chairman.
 The Young Democrats took their action on the forthcoming bond issue after hearing the proposal outlined by Robert Schrage, finance chairman of the Deschutes County Democratic Central Committee, host organization for the YD meeting. Members of the central committee here also urged a "yes" vote on the bond issue.

Portland State, Reed College and the University of Oregon YD clubs were represented at the meeting here along with YD members of Roosevelt and Lincoln high schools in Portland and the Pleasant Hill club.

Unable to Attend
 Ann Fowler, Portland, state treasurer of the Young Democrats, presided over the meeting in the absence of Richard Mueller, Portland attorney, who was ill and unable to attend.

John McDonald, formerly of Bend, but now a student at the University of Oregon, reported that YD's had succeeded in having more than 2,000 persons register prior to the deadline for voting in the May primary.

Deschutes County Democratic Central Committee members held their regular monthly meeting immediately following the YD session.

Four unopposed candidates in the primary addressed the joint central committee - YD session. They included Sheriff Forrest Sholes, Judge Charles L. Allen, candidate for state senator, Ben Evick, Madras, former representative, who seeks reelection to that office, and Harry Skjersaa, Bend businessman who is a candidate for county commissioner. The candidates were introduced by former state representative O. W. Grubb.

Al Weeks, chairman of the Deschutes county committee, told the group that campaign headquarters for the fall election would not be opened before the first week in September. "A campaign of more than 60 days becomes tiresome to the public and hard on candidates and party workers, alike," he said. "This does not mean, of course, that the candidates will not be available to meet with any public groups who wish to hear them at any time, and they will be campaigning in their own respective ways from today on," added the chairman.

Lodge reported 'reluctant' Oregon primary candidate

HONOLULU (UPI)—U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge "reluctantly" allowed his supporters to campaign for him in the New Hampshire and Oregon presidential primaries for the sole purpose of blocking the nomination of Sen. Barry Goldwater, the Honolulu Advertiser reported Saturday.
 In a copyrighted dispatch, Managing Editor Buck Buchwach said the South Vietnamese ambassador made the remarks after the New Hampshire primary, which Lodge won easily as a write-in candidate.
 Buchwach described his sources as anonymous, but unimpeachable persons who said that Lodge had explained his political motives to both civilian and military intimates in Saigon on several occasions.
 However, Buchwach wrote, "Lodge has told intimates he did not intend—and still does not intend—to seek the presidential nomination."
 Buchwach quoted Lodge as telling friends: "I am 61 and I have had it. Lodge will be 62 in July when the Republican nominating convention is held in San Francisco."
 "But Lodge has made it clear he is unalterably opposed to Goldwater as the Republican presidential candidate," Buchwach wrote.
 "He has said it was for this reason alone—that he gave his son and his friends reluctant approval to conduct campaigns in his behalf in the New Hampshire and Oregon GOP primaries."
 Buchwach said that even if Lodge should win the May 15 Oregon primary the ambassador indicated that would not mean he would run.
 Lodge was quoted as telling friends in Saigon, "I like politics but I have lost six times... and that seems about enough."
 Buchwach said one of his indirect sources was a "ranking Pacific military chief" who had heard Lodge make similar statements, both before and after the New Hampshire primary.
 In Portland, David Goldberg, the national field director of the Draft Lodge Committee, said:
 "I can't believe the ambassador said any such thing. Certainly that is not our purpose. Our purpose is to draft Henry Cabot Lodge for the Republican nomination. We are not opposed to any of the Republican contenders. We are simply for Lodge. I can't speak for the ambassador but I can't conceive he would have said any such thing."

CAMAS, Wash. (UPI)—A 28-year-old pilot, four of his children and a neighbor child were killed Sunday when a light plane crashed on a tree-covered hillside six miles north of here.
 The victims were Lee Roggenkamp, Camas; his four children, Rhonda, 8; Randall, 7; Robin, 4, and Ryan, 2, and Jean Vandenberghe, 8.
 The accident occurred about 500 yards from Roggenkamp's home.

"Oh, God, no, don't take them away from me," Mrs. Roggenkamp said after running to the wreckage. She was taken to a hospital at Vancouver.

Roggenkamp, who was a partner in a septic tank contracting business, was taking his children and the other child for a short flight in his four - place, single-engine Stinson aircraft.
 He circled his home twice.
