House plants, birds on agenda

The Bend Garden Club, at a recent meeting, had a program on birds and house plants, and made plans for coming events.

Mrs. Ed Bolter, Madras, district director of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, outlined plans for the district meeting May 2 at Glichrist. Mrs. F. B. Anderson, Portland, was also a visitor.

Mrs. Nellie Hayman gave a talk on birds of the local area, and gave suggestions for providing houses to their liking.

The club voted to contribute to the 4-H summer school scholarship fund.

The question of cleaning house plants was discussed by the group. Various methods were described.

Leaves of large - leafed plants should be supported with one hand and wiped gently with a damp cloth, it was reported. In the case of hairy or fuzzy leaves, one leaf may be removed and held by the stem, to use as a brush to wipe off dust from base to tip.

For removing greasy soil, plants may be dunked upside-down into a pan of lukewarm water containing a small amount of liquid soap (not detergent) after soil is first secured with a tight-fitting foil cover. Pots are then rinsed, and foliage given a spray rinse with tepid water.

A memorial service was held for the late Mrs. D. F. Carlin. Mrs. S. V. Patterson was hostess, assisted by Mrs. Carl B. Binder. Fourteen members were present.

The next meeting will be a potluck dinner and slide program for members and their families, at the VFW Hall.

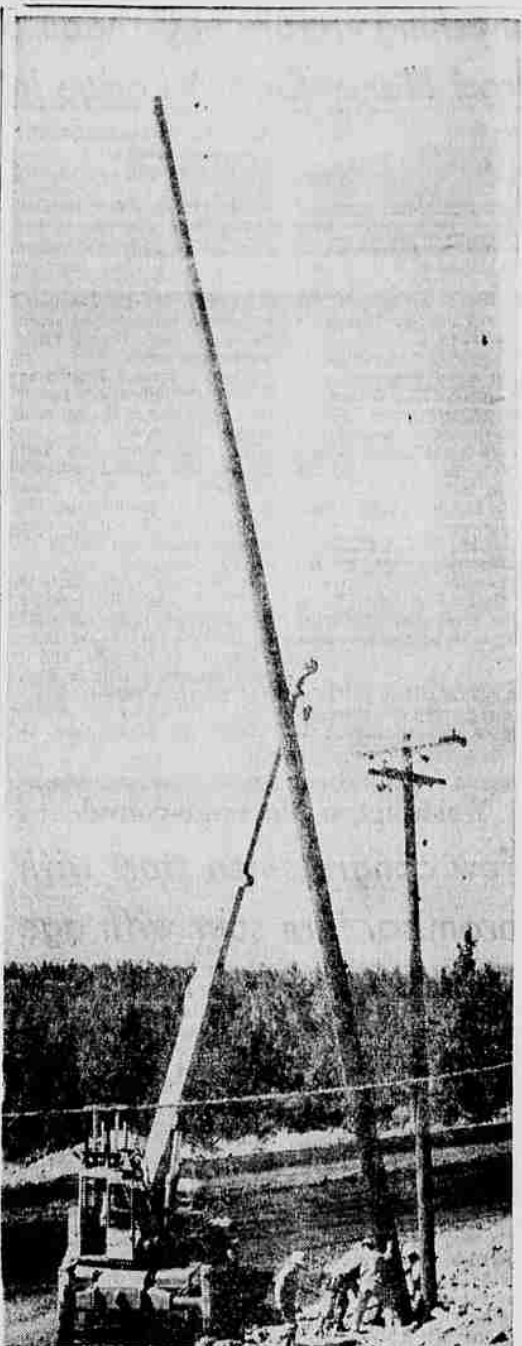
