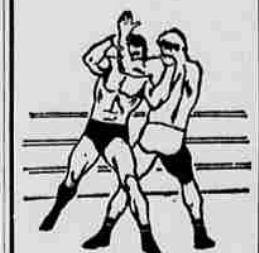

Edward A. Phelps

Edward A. Phelps, 54, a resident of the Bend area for the past 10 years, died at St. Charles Memorial Hospital last night after a long illness.

Services will be announced later by Niswonger - Reynolds Funeral Home.

A native of Hood River, Mr. Phelps was born Feb. 2, 1910, and for the past decade has made his home at Route 2, Box 9B, Bend.

He is survived by his widow, Irene Phelps, of the family home, and children: Rene Phelps, Bend; Michael Phelps and Rhonda Phelps, Bend; John E. Phelps, Hood River; Dennis Mockler, Grand Forks, N.D.; and Terry Mockler, Bend.

Mr. Phelps also is survived by brothers and sisters: Margaret Malaer, Beaverton; Norris DeLore, Coos Bay; Harry Phelps, Condon; Edna French, Lakeview, Calif.; Elmer D. Phelps, Bridgeport, Calif.; and Ruth McDonald, Kent, Wash. A. D. Phelps, Hood River, a stepmother, also survives.

George L. Conklin

George L. Conklin, 74, resident of Bend since 1917, long with the Shevlin - Hixon Company and later with Brooks Scanlon, Inc. here, died this morning at his home in this city, at 348 State Street. He was a native of Sleepyeye, Minn., where he was born on March 18, 1888, the son of Frank and Mertie Conklin.

Mr. Conklin attended high school at Lockwood, Mo., and took his advanced work at Morehead Teachers' College, Morehead, Minn. He taught school for a short time near Frazee, Minn., then entered the employ of Nichols & Chisholm Lumber Co., a Shevlin affiliate, in 1910, near Frazee. He started as a scaler and camp clerk, then moved into the surveying and timber cruising field for the firm. In 1917, Mr. Conklin was transferred to The Shevlin-Hixon

Company in Bend.

Mr. Conklin served with the Army's Spruce Division in World War I, producing lumber for planes. He returned to Bend at the war's end. In October, 1919, he married Bertha Wierbach, of Detroit Lake, Minn.

Mr. Conklin received his Oregon professional logging engineer certificate in 1935, and in 1936 made an extended trip to Mexico for the Shevlin-Hixon firm. He entered the employ of Brooks-Scanlon in 1950 as construction foreman, and worked there until his retirement in 1959.

In addition to his wife, Mr. Conklin is survived by two sons, James of Palo Alto, Calif., and Robert, of Phoenix, Ariz., and two daughters, Maurine, of Salem, and Ruth of New York City.

Mr. Conklin was a member of the Masonic lodge. The Niswonger & Reynolds Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements, with funeral services to be announced later.

Mrs. Alice L. Kopp

Funeral services for Mrs. Alice L. Kopp, 73, were held last week at the Simon Lounsbury Funeral Home in Eugene. Mrs. Kopp had been a resident of Eugene since moving from Bend 11 years ago. She died April 10.

Mrs. Kopp was born Oct. 26, 1890, in Tracy, Minn. She is survived by her husband, Louis; two sons, Morris of Redmond and Howard of Eugene, and a brother, Claude Wood, Olympia, Wash. There are eight grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

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Building study set by county

The Deschutes County Court will appoint an advisory committee to appraise plans for a proposed auxiliary courthouse building, Judge D. L. Penhollow said today.

Robert C. Menton, of the architectural firm of Stearns, Menton & Morris, yesterday presented drawings of a building tentatively planned for county property back of the courthouse, recently developed as a parking lot. The building would cost approximately \$60,000.

Representatives of the welfare department and the extension service, agencies which are seeking additional space, were present to offer suggestions to the court. A meeting room, for extension meetings and other public use, is included in the plans.

A \$50,000 sinking fund, for courthouse building or expansion, was included in the budget for the current fiscal year.

Engle spokesman issues denial on resignation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A spokesman for Sen. Clair Engle, D-Calif., today denied a published report that the senator had decided not to seek reelection because of a new medical report holding that he could not withstand the rigors of another campaign.

Paul Green, Engle's press aide, said the California senator was still waiting for a report from his doctors that would "tell the story of his condition."

Green said the report would be made public when it is received in a few days. "The senator has no plans to withdraw," he said.

The medical report, Green said, was expected "in the next day or two."

"As soon as we do we will make it public to everyone, not just to one newspaper on an exclusive basis," he said.

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1,340 DEMONSTRATIONS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department reports there were 1,340 civil rights demonstrations in the United States in the three months starting last May 20. The figure was given in a statement made public Tuesday by a House appropriations subcommittee.

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
