Women return from convention

Three Bend residents, Mrs. Irwin H. Lenaburg, Mrs. Karl Kiesow and Mrs. Henry Leersens, returned yesterday after attending the fourth biennial Oregon District convention of the Lutheran Women's League of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, at Ashland. Mrs. Lenaburg attended as a delegate from Bend.

Delegates attended from Oregon, Washington and California, and numbered 266 for the two-day convention, April 21 and 22. Mrs. A. D. Moore, Eugene, was elected president.

Projects approved by the delegates for the next biennium included \$3,500 for a chapel project at Monmouth; \$1,850 for a chapel for Juneau, Alaska, and \$1,750 for a chapel at Chugiak, Alaska.

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Oregon AAUW winds up its session here

The Oregon Division of American Association of University Women wound up its 39th annual convention today in Bend, with a luncheon at the Masonic Temple honoring 25-year chapters, Lakeview and Tillamook.

This morning, a petition for the new branch in Newberg, 32rd in the state, was approved.

Long awaited announcement of the winner of the \$1,500 Oregon Division Graduate Fellowship award for next year was made at the closing luncheon. The award goes to Miss Patricia E. Jones of Corvallis, who was present to accept it.

A teacher of French at Corvallis High School, she will begin work this summer at Middlebury College, Vermont, only college offering a degree of doctor of modern languages. Next year, she will study in France. The award was made by Mrs. Robert Mosar of Warrenton, state fellowships chairman.

The Oregon Division is the only state division in AAUW making an award to residents of its state. It is made every three years.

Following a smorgasbord buffet last night, Mrs. John P. Shannon, of Billings, Mont., North Pacific Region vice-president, was the speaker. She outlined recent developments in AAUW within the region and on the national level, and defined her belief of the true key to both understanding and learning.

Recognition of an Alaska Division, fifth state division in the region, is expected to be made at the 1965 convention in Portland, it was reported.

Mrs. Shannon charged the members to put a new concentration on enabling college women to continue their own intellectual growth.

"Truly educated women," she said, "able to differentiate fact and opinion, disciplined in objectivity, able to know and to speak the truth, clear about their own values, and instinctively creative, can bring their training, influence and judgment to bear on any issue they wish to make their concern."
