Memorial services for Mrs. Robert (Pat) Kulstad, 46, will be held Sunday, May 3, at 2 p.m. at the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, 1029 W. 14th Street. She was apparently a victim of the Good Friday earthquake at Valdez, Alaska. The trailer house she and her husband occupied was swept off a dock and into the sea.

Her husband, Robert, who survives, was also at first thought killed. He was evacuated from Valdez after he saw the wreckage of the docks, and was not heard from by local relatives until two weeks ago. He may now be reached at P.O. Box 102, Valdez.

Mrs. Kulstad is survived also

by a son, Roger, 24, now also of Valdez, and seven brothers and sisters. They are: Mary Moye, Bend; Olive Monica, Redmond; John and Robert Henderson, Albany; Martha Scott, Portland; Shirley Young, Salem; and Tom Henderson, Memphis, Tenn.

Another brother, Paul Henderson, Seattle, Wash., died this past April 13, less than four weeks after his sister.

Members of the family have asked that friends who wish to make memorial gifts do so in the form of contributions to the Alaska Relief Fund.

Boise Cascade reports gain of 88 per cent

BOISE (UPI)—Boise Cascade Corporation today reported a gain in net income of 88 per cent for the first quarter of 1964 compared with the same period a year ago.

Net sales, said R. W. Halliday, vice president and treasurer, increased 15 per cent over the same period last year.

In dollars, 1964 first quarter income increased to \$1,307,000 from \$671,000 for the first quarter of 1963, he said. Net sales were \$50,217,000 in the first quarter of 1964 compared with \$43,713,000 for the period a year ago. Cash flow was \$3,543,000 for the 1964 period and \$2,648,000 one year ago.

This month, Boise Cascade's new plywood mill started production at Elgin, Ore., and expansion was completed for plywood plants at Independence, Ore., and Yakima, Wash. Recently announced to begin operations June 1 was a new plant at Salem, Ore., to manufacture corrugated shipping containers for the canning and food processing industry and other users of the greater Willamette Valley and western Oregon.

Halliday said that on May 1 the corporation expects to take over the St. Helens Pulp and Paper Mill now owned by the Crown Zellerbach Corporation.

Bond purchase drop reported

Purchase of U.S. Savings Bonds in Deschutes county this past month, \$17,574, dropped sharply from the figure for the same month in 1963, when the total was \$23,633. Crook county also reported a drop from \$24,667 last year to \$14,423 this past month. Jefferson's March purchases this year amounted to \$4,635, compared with \$4,940 a year ago in March.

Although there was a drop in sales this past month in Deschutes county, the total for the first quarter of the present year, \$48,663, is well above the \$77,253 figure for the first quarter of 1963.

XIS FLIGHT SLATED

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI)—Winged astronaut Maj. Bob Rushworth was scheduled to take the X15 rocket ship on its 10th flight today in a test of what effect supersonic turbulence has on photography.

Rushworth was expected to hit a speed of 3,900 miles an hour and reach an altitude of 102,000 feet — taking only 11 minutes for his 240-mile trip along the edge of space.

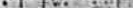
Panama and the United States agreed on April 3 to reestablish diplomatic relations for the purpose of resolving differences over the 1903 Panama Canal treaty.

A proposed development plan for the east end of the Bear Creek Addition was presented to the Bend Planning Commission Monday night.

Ross Mitchell and Gene Hawthorne asked the commission for modifications of road width and setback regulations. Permission to vacate E. 14th Street was also asked.

Five residents of the area whose property borders the proposed development were in attendance at the meeting. Donald L. Houk, spokesman for the bordering property owners, urged the commission to take a first hand look at the site before passing any judgment.

No Objections: No specific objection was made by the group to the proposed development, only that the commission inspect the property. Mitchell and Hawthorne also recommended an inspection by the commission.

A meeting is scheduled for May 1 to consider the requests.

Developer Don Erwin presented a preliminary plat for subdivision of some property located between Butler Market Road and Studio Road on the E. Oberholte place. The commission referred the proposal to city engineer John Eaton for study. The planners will give their answer to the preliminary plat at

Boy, 4, has close brush with death

PRINEVILLE — Little Scott McPhetridge, aged 4, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McPhetridge, felt a close brush with tragedy Sunday afternoon when he was struck by a car on the Madras highway some six miles from Prineville.

Scott and his brother Jimmie, 6, were looking for beer bottles in the borrow pit along the highway near their home. Scott decided to cross the road and it was believed the strong wind kept him from hearing cars approaching from both directions.

Driver of one vehicle, Norma Colpitts, The Dalles, slowed and put her car into the ditch as far as possible to avoid striking the child but struck him, apparently at low speed, with the front left corner of the car.

The child was tossed into the highway and suffered bruises and a skinned scalp. He was taken by his father, who had been working in a nearby field, to Pioneer Memorial Hospital where he was checked and released.

The child was reported in normal lively spirits at home Monday.
