Offer accepted by druggists

PORTLAND (UPI)—Portland-area pharmacists voted Monday night to accept a three-year contract offering hourly wage increases of 57 1/2 cents for pharmacists and 52 1/2 cents for pharmacy technicians.

The pharmacists are members of Local 1092 of the Food and Drug Clerks union. The wage increases will give section heads a weekly wage of \$192.50 and pharmacists \$182.50 by the final year of the contract.

The new contract, retroactive to March 29, also includes an option to participate in an employer-paid retirement program and a dental care program if those items are negotiated by a larger segment of the union.

Other fringe benefits also were included. Secretary-treasurer Gordon Swope, said there was some opposition to the proposed contract because of dissatisfaction with pay for Sunday work. Pharmacists now receive two hours of extra pay for Sunday work, but had asked for time-and-a-half.

Plans for legal fight mapped by Coast group

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Coast Association today announced the appointment of a legal firm to push its battle against the Scenic Area Commission. William Easton, association president, said Poling and Lewelling of Newport had been hired to handle "what is expected to be eventually a Supreme Court fight against the activities of the Scenic Commission."

The Association recently charged the commission was arbitrary in its rulings and was trying to endanger business interests along the coast by banning billboards and other advertising signs.

Verne Ayers, association manager, told UPI "we intend to carry this thing out to the bitter end, and in spite of all the panning we have been getting in the newspapers, it's a serious matter with us."

Gov. Mark Hatfield last week termed the 20 Miracle Miles section of the coast the "20 Miserable Miles" and said the area should clean up its junky appearance.

Meanwhile, the Scenic Board has scheduled two coast hearings. The commission will meet at Cannon Beach May 4 to consider a petition to withdraw portions of previously designated scenic areas at three locations near Cannon Beach.

The commission also has scheduled public hearings May 5 and 7 to consider designations of scenic areas in Tillamook, Lincoln, Clatsop and Columbia counties.

Easton charged the scenic board "was made up of zealots intent upon clearing all highways of signs and going far beyond the statutes under which the board came into existence in 1961."

Easton said "many of the businesses along the Oregon coast are fighting for their very economic lives."
