

Johnson urges affirmative vote on 'bonds for higher education'

The second meeting of a newly-organized Republican Women's Club of Deschutes County was held yesterday afternoon, with Sam Johnson of Redmond as the guest speaker.

Johnson, candidate for state representative, discussed Ballot Measure No. 1, the so-called "bonds for higher education" proposal. The measure, he pointed out, would alter Oregon's constitution to enable bonding to provide \$30 million dollars to finance higher education buildings. Of this amount, he said, \$5 million dollars would be earmarked for the state's community colleges, including Central Oregon college which would obtain the funds needed to carry on the school's current building program.

Chairman Weeks said that Bob Straub, a former state chairman of the Democratic Party of Oregon, and now a candidate for state treasurer, would come here from Springfield to introduce Senator Morse at the breakfast meeting.

Mrs. Robert Schrage, vice-chairman of the Deschutes County Central Committee, will preside at Saturday night's dinner meeting and introduce Congressman Ullman.

were Gordon McKay, Bend, who spoke briefly in behalf of his candidacy for state senator from the 19th district; Bob Smith, state legislator from Burns, who is a candidate for delegate to the National Republican Convention; and Mrs. Helen Daughtrey of Portland, president of the Oregon Federation of Republican Women, who extended an invitation to the local group to affiliate with this organization.

Mrs. Daughtrey, who is also a candidate for delegate to the convention, mentioned, in addition, the importance of electing at least four women delegates to the convention to insure representation from Oregon on the four significant convention committees. A new ruling, she pointed out, provides for these committees to be constituted of a male and female delegate from each state.

Presiding at the luncheon meeting, which was attended by a large group of Republican women, was Mrs. Kessler Cannon. Introductions were handled by Vern Robinson, chairman of the Deschutes County Republican Central Committee, and Kessler Cannon, current state legislator.

Next meeting of the group will be May 26 at Redmond.

FIGHT OVER MUSSOLINI

NAPLES, Italy (UPI)—Young neo-Fascists fought with left-wingers outside a Naples church Tuesday night where a mass was said for former dictator Benito Mussolini on his 19th anniversary of his execution by Italian partisans.

Police broke up the fight. Twenty youths were detained and one demonstrator and two policemen were slightly injured.

French remove naval officers from NATO

PARIS (UPI)—Allied officials appeared concerned today that France might follow up its withdrawal of naval officers from North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) commands by moves affecting French forces in Germany.

The French government announced Tuesday that it has withdrawn all 10 senior French naval officers from NATO commands, on the ground that there were no longer any sizable French units under them.

President Charles de Gaulle had pulled French naval units out of the NATO Mediterranean fleet in 1959. Three months ago, he removed the bulk of France's Atlantic fleet and NATO control.

Only five French submarines in the North Sea still operate under NATO. The rest of the French navy is under purely French command.

NATO officials appeared concerned about the future of the two and one-half French army divisions and three air force nuclear fighter wings under NATO command in West Germany.

French officials have denied reports that the army and air force units will be withdrawn from NATO control.

The French army units in Germany total 75,000 men, compared to 250,000 of the United States and 49,000 of the British, whose units are below strength.

Quarterly report issued by bank

The Bend branch of the First National reported first quarter deposits of \$11,329,254 and loans outstanding of \$9,408,581, according to information from M. F. Shelton, branch manager.

Comparable totals for the branch a year ago were \$10,275,659 in deposits and \$8,448,847 in loans.

On April 15, the Prineville branch of the First National reported loans of \$9,621,036 and deposits of \$10,551,958. Comparable totals for that branch a year ago were \$7,406,650 in loans and \$10,531,125 in deposits.

The Madras branch reported loans of \$3,185,285 and deposits of \$1,789,917. These figures compare with \$1,944,557 in loans and \$987,909 for the earlier period.

Statewide, First National of Oregon recorded the highest first quarter deposit and loan figures in the history of the bank, Ralph M. Voss, president, said. Deposits climbed to \$1,041,866,332 for the period ending April 15, as compared with \$970,180,000 for the similar period in 1963.

Construction is expected to begin soon on new buildings in several upstate points, including Bend.
