

Judd pleaded guilty to manslaughter in a plea deal calling for 75 months in prison. The deal included a provision allowing Judd to appeal Bagley's ruling allowing Jones' testimony. In 2019, the Oregon Court of Appeals sided

with Judd and sent her case back to Deschutes County for retrial.

By April 2020, Judd had been in custody for 50 months. She pleaded guilty again, this time

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
