STATEMENT OF CHANGES IN ACTIVITIES and SOURCES OF FINANCING

The FY22 budget maintains services provided over the past fiscal year. In addition, the budget continues to invest responsibly in infrastructure maintenance to ensure future budgets are not overly burdened with deferred maintenance of the City's most basic and essential infrastructures. GENERAL OPERATING FUNDS (GOFs) - FY21 marked elve consecutive years where the City's General Operating Funds were balanced. Over the last 8 years, property tax revenue has seen strong growth (76% in total or 9% per year) allowing the City to improve core services in areas such as public safety, parks and streets. FY21 also brought approximately \$3.6M in non-recurring resources which are mostly reserved in FY22 for a new Public Safety Facility. Police - The budget increases funding for the Police department. In the 3 budgets preceding COVID-19 staffing increased by 15% (7.5 FTEs) with the goal of balancing workload, officer safety and time for proactive enforcement. With COVID-19 financial uncertainty subsiding for ne General Fund, that effort to address staffing needs continues in FY22 with 3.5 new positions. Funding for the Street Crimes Unit (SCU) is maintained covering activities ich as illicit drug investigations, highway criminal interdiction, search and seizure, and street level tactical operations. Parks patrol by cadets is maintained, and the budget ontinues funding towards a police vehicle replacement program. The budget also includes a needs assessment study for a new Public Safety Facility. Transportation - 1
Y22 budget includes 2 additional utility workers and maintains the annual investment in road maintenance at \$1.2M. The latest Pavement Condition Index (PCI) suggests his is an appropriate funding level to keep our roads in great condition and safe for the community. The FY22 budget also includes about \$5.2M in street improve orojects including: 1) reconstruction and modernization of NE Hemlock Ave. - a major connector to the highway for northeast industrial properties, 2) re-alignment of SW Salmon Ave. to the Odem Medo Rd. / S Canal Blvd. intersection to add efficiency and improve safety and, 3) design for a new roundabout on Airport Way to improve travel the Airport, ease congestion at the fairgrounds, and prepare for growth on the 900-acre Large Lot Industrial Land. Parks - The budget includes 2 additional utility workers ind works to bring exciting additions to the City's park system including: 1) the new Quartz Park (\$2.7M) on the south side of the Dry Canyon, 2) upgrade and replacement of ne play structure at Umatilla Sports Complex (\$250k) and, 3) Maple Ave. staircase (\$165k), enhancing connectivity to the system. UTILITIES - The City's utility funds are in nanageable financial position, which is important as projects addressing capacity issues stretch System Development Charges (SDCs) thin. Keeping expenditures matched o revenues requires incremental rate increases (1.4% overall in FY22). The budget includes \$650k for pipe replacement projects which allows for the replacement of about 0.6 miles of old pipe. This improves water distribution and quality. One of the largest projects (\$6.6M) in the FY22 budget is the South Redmond Water Facility (SRWF) which includes the construction of a new pump station, well, reservoir and connecting water lines. SRWF will ensure adequate water distribution as growth occurs on the south side of Redmond. Also, the City will design (\$1.8M) the expansion of the Wastewater treatment plant, which entails moving processes to the City's irrigation site and constructing a agoon treatment system with a constructed wetland treatment and disposal system to support the overall growth that is occurring in Redmond well into the future. AIRPORT The Airport Fund enters the FY22 budget with some return of passenger activity and the support of federal relief funds to weather the unprecedented downfall. Prior to 20VID-19 the airport doubled passenger activity over 6 years, necessitating growth related projects in every facet of the Airport including early plans for a terminal expansion. COVID-19 then severely impacted passenger traffic with a 96% decrease in the fourth quarter of FY20, causing an enormous decline in revenues. Overall, FY21 was about a 48% decrease in passenger activity from the trailing 12 months before COVID-19. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Acts passed by Congress yielded \$11.8M in relief funding for the Airport, enabling operations to be maintained and brought financial stability from the end of FY20 to the beginning of FY22. Similarly, the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act passed by Congress (estimated at \$4M in FY22 budget) provided further financial/operational stability through FY22. The FY22 budget looks to sustain an environment for rebuilding flight activity by maintaining operations, keeping air carrier rates and charges unchanged and moving forward on everal capital improvements. PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE - The budget includes funding towards several planning projects - most notably \$100k for a Master Developer shepherd the Skyline Village Affordable Housing Pilot Project.
