China's Mars rover touches ground on the red planet

BEIJING — China's first Mars rover has driven down from its landing platform and is now roaming the surface of the red planet, China's space administration said Saturday.

The solar-powered rover touched Martian soil at 10:40 a.m. Saturday Beijing time, the China National Space Administration said.

China landed the spacecraft carrying the rover on Mars a week before, a technically challenging feat more difficult than a moon landing, in a first for the country. It is the second country to land and operate a spacecraft on Mars, after the **United States.**

Named after the Chinese god of fire, Zhurong, the rover has been running diagnostics tests for several days before it began its exploration Saturday. It is expected to be deployed for 90 days to search of evidence of life.

The U.S. has an ongoing

Mars mission, with the Perseverance rover and a tiny helicopter exploring the planet. NASA expects the rover to col-lect its first sample in July for return to Earth as early as 2031.

China has ambitious space plans that include launching a crewed orbital station and landing a human on the moon. China in 2019 became the first country to land a space probe on the little-explored far side of the moon.

Continued from A1 "It's a pretty humbling moment, honestly," Hopper said

Saturday. "Looking back at it, it seems like a blur." Crook County Fire & Rescue and Prineville Police responded around 10 a.m. to the fire, which was isolated to the garage.

"They kept the fire from get-ting into the house," Hopper said. "It sounded like there was pretty minimal damage."

Hopper gives credit to the neighbor, who was the first on scene and called 911. The neighbor went into the house and closed all the doors to the garage, which helped keep the fire in the garage, Hopper said. "The guy who flagged me

down, he's the one who really made a lot of the heroic efforts," Hopper said. "If he wouldn't have done that, I don't think the outcome would have been the same."

Hopper is grateful he was driving by as the smoke started to spread. He was in his truck on the way to a nearby job site for his concrete business, Hopper Concrete Pumping.

If he passed by any later, the woman may have suffered from breathing in smoke, he said.

"She didn't have much more time before the whole house was full of smoke," Hopper said.

"The timing just happened to be perfect."
