Women hold 51% of entry-level positions and 38% of senior-management jobs in the banking and consumer-finance industry in the U.S., according to a report last year from McKinsey & Co. Both figures are higher than the average across study...

The figures are far less encouraging at the highest levels. Only one of the 18 banks in the S&P 500 Index has a female chief executive officer.

"When you already have a workforce that has a lot of women, there are more opportunities for women's leadership," said Sarah Kaplan, a professor at the University of Toronto and the director of the Institute for Gender and the Economy.

The teller position has been the springboard for some of

the highest-ranking women in North American banking. Bank of the West Chief Executive Officer Nandita Bakhshi. Toronto-Dominion Canadian personal-banking head Teri Currie and Duke all started as

Duke said the movement of women into banking's highest ranks is happening much she's optimistic about the industry's future, in part because banks have diversified their boards.

#### 'Bench Strength'

"When you look at the bench strength in all of the banking world, the next generation of CEOs will include a number of outstanding women," she said.

Handley, whose crew is starting at 4:30 a.m. daily, is also short on labor.

Growers across Wenatchee and Yakima say because California's cherry harvest started late, picking crews have been late to arrive in Washington.

Kirstjn Eggers, another small-scale Wenatchee grower, is missing half of her usual crew because many of her "reg-ulars" are still picking farther south in California and Mattawa and Pasco in Washington.

Eggers' crew the past few nights has started picking at 7 p.m. and worked until 2 or

"We've had a lot of overripe fruit due to the heat and shortage of pickers," she said.

Some large operations with more established H-2A visa worker programs are faring

Teah Smith, entomologist and ag consultant at Yakima-based Zirkle Fruit Co., said Zirkle has a relatively strong labor force this season, with 250 pickers in the orchards.

The crews, she said, have been working from about 2 a.m. to 11 a.m.

"I think there will be some damage from heat," she said. "But I don't think we're too worried about it because of the people we have."

In Oregon, The Dalles region is also under a triple-digit heat warning Saturday through

July 4.
"We have never experienced these temperatures in June before," said Brenda Thomas, grower and president of Orchard View Farms in The Dalles.

Thomas said she's prioritizing worker health and safety, only picking from 5 a.m. to 10 a.m.

Thomas said she thinks it's too early to tell to what extent the heat will impact the Northwest crop.

"It's hard to predict," she said.

"We would love to increase the number of RVs that we're making, but there's several mitigating factors," Lance Rinker, the director of purchasing and marketing for Northwood Manufacturing and Outdoors

RV, said. Northwood and Outdoors each manufacture roughly 230

RVs every month, a number that has not risen with the increased demand. Rinker estimates that manufacturing prices have risen nearly 20% since the onset of the pandemic, partially due to higher fuel prices and lumber short-

ages. Retail prices have risen with increased manufacturing costs. Weinkauf said that Thunder RV prices have risen 10%

in the last year. Prices range from \$25,000 for a basic truck camper to nearly \$100,000 for high-end fifth wheel RVs.

With no end in sight, Weinkauf said he is optimistic that business will continue to

"Well, they're building them as fast as they can, and we're selling them just as quickly," he said. "It's gonna take some time to catch up."
