Former Oregon State star Mikayla Pivec discusses the value of NIL for women

The former Oregon State women's basketball star could have been an ideal candidate to take advantage of college athletics' updated name, image and likeness rules that kicked in Thursday.

Pivec, who finished her OSU career in 2020, will root from afar for her former teammates and Beaver athletes regarding new opportunities. Pivec looks back at her tenure and recalls not even being able to accept a \$5 cup of coffee from someone because it might jeopardize el-

igibility. Now, Pivec could not only take the coffee, but profit from endorsing the coffee.

T-storms

Pivec, who plays professional updated NIL rules are particularly important for women.

"Those four years of college, as a female athlete especially, that's where you have the most exposure," Pivec said. "That's $\ensuremath{\text{w}\bar{\text{h}}\text{e}\text{re}}$ you can really create as many connections as you can and help whatever cause, or whatever you want to do."

Pivec says she "missed out on a window," particularly where she could have used social media to profit from her name, image and likeness. It would have come in handy, and will be a boost for future players in her sport looking to play professional basketball.

I feel like I could have built up a little bit of a safety net," Pivec said. "It's a good supplement for those wanting to play professional basketball, because a lot of women may give up on their dream earlier, or may not pursue it because the money isn't there."

Another aspect of NIL close to Pivec is the ability to help nonprofits. During her college

tenure, Pivec couldn't so much as pose for a picture to help out a charity. Weeks after her basketball career ended and early during the pandemic, Pivec helped start "Selfless Servings," which raised money to purchase restaurant meals for Cor-

vallis-area health care workers. If Pivec were still in college, she said, "I would have still volunteered for free and done


certain things, just to help the community."

Pivec doesn't recall prominent conversations from basketball teammates about potential endorsement opportunities. But it was a hot topic of discussion while she was a member of OSU's Student Athlete Advisory Committee.

"I thought something like this would happen, but five, 10 years down the line, not full force like it is Thursday," Pivec

Pivec does worry that NIL could sidetrack the primary mission of student-athletes.

"It could go really poorly if agents want to get in on all these athletes being distracted from what they're really there to do, which is to compete and get a degree," Pivec said.

They will never catch up with the women, who have made it perfectly clear by near-perfect attendance that the Olympics mean as much to them as anything they play.

"I can't speak for what Olympics mean for a lot of people," Danielle Kang said last week. "But for me, it's everything."

There are differences to consider, of course, namely the tour schedules and the stakes, along with the fame the women get at the Olympics that doesn't hap-pen at some of their majors, like the Evian Championship.

For the administrators who lobbied to get golf into the Olympics, they should be encouraged by two Olympics separated by five years and two viruses.

It was largely concern and fear about the Zika virus that kept 22 eligible players from going to the 2016 Olympics. There was an unspoken pledge they would be all in for Japan.

That was before the outbreak of the new coronavirus. The Olympics not only were postponed, but COVID-19 restrictions in place for the Tokyo Games to go on have stripped away so much fun and activity involved with being Olympic athletes.

Wait until Paris in 2024! On to Los Angeles in 2028!

If only it were that simple. Johnson already was planning to skip the Olympics be-fore the pandemic. He had not won the FedEx Cup and it both-ered him, so he didn't want to fly halfway around the world after a major and before a World Golf Championship and then play three consecutive weeks with a \$15 million prize at stake. Turns out he won it last year, anyway.

There will be more players like him.

And that's why there will be attendance issues with the men. As long as there is a pot of gold at the end of the Olympics, the value of Olympic gold will suf-

The men's majors have a century or more of history behind them. The Olympics went a century without having golf.

Consider the last few months. Kang couldn't keep her eyes off the world ranking, hopeful she could hold down her position and earn a spot in the Olympics. For the men, the Olympics are like the Presidents Cup. No one really talks about it until the final week to make the team.

"I just think men golfers, they just have so many big events," Inbee Park said. "They have so many opportunities and so many different weeks with so many big tournaments. For us, I think it's a little different. We're

not as big as men's golf. "So I think girls just treat it a

little differently," she said. "Men trying to work it in their schedule with a lot more tournaments going on and a lot more going on is different."

It was a big deal for Park, who delivered a true Olympic moment.

Think of the sports in which athletes trained their entire lives for a stage that comes along once every four years. Park sat out from top competition for two months to let an injury heal, even as there were whispers in South Korea that she should give up her spot to another player in the powerhouse country.

Park then whipped up on the No. 1 player in the world to win

the gold medal. It's a big deal for Sungjae Im and Siwoo Kim, who can avoid mandatory military service in South Korea by winning an Olympic medal. Not even a

green jacket can do that. For so many other men, it's more of an honor than a priority. As long as they play, there's nothing wrong with that.
