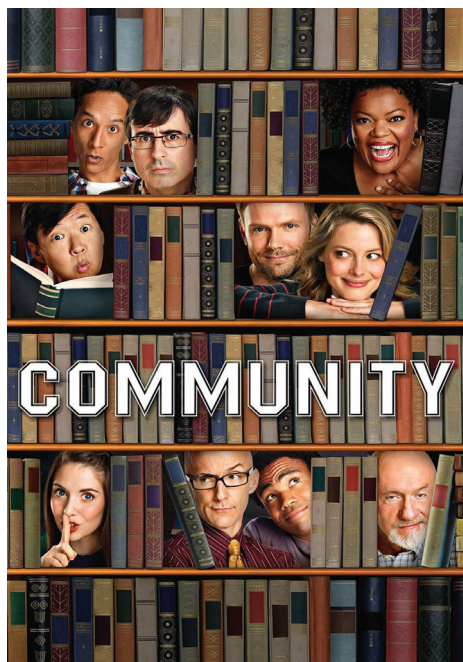


# What's Available **NOW** On prime video

## BEST GENE WILDER MOVIES

**"Bonnie and Clyde" (1967)** Wilder made a big splash as a hostage of the title gangsters (Warren Beatty, Faye Dunaway).

**"The Producers" (1968)** As the title backers of a stage show they wanted to fail, Wilder and Zero Mostel helped Mel Brooks gain a foothold in the movie world.

**"Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory" (1971)** Wilder is a favorite of several generations as the so-called Candy Man.

**"Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Sex (But Were Afraid to Ask)" (1972)** That Wilder plays it so straight as a psychiatrist who falls in love with his newest patient — a sheep — makes his segment of Woody Allen's vignette-structured comedy hilarious.

**"Blazing Saddles" (1974)** As a drunken gunslinger, Wilder makes a great sidekick to

Rock Ridge's new sheriff (Cleavon Little) in Mel Brooks' Western satire. It's the first half of a Wilder double feature Sunday, April 24, on Turner Classic Movies.

**"Young Frankenstein" (1974)** Teamed with Mel Brooks again — also as a writer in this case — Wilder sends up a horror classic as a descendant of the synthetic-man-creating scientist.

**"The Adventure of Sherlock Holmes' Smarter Brother" (1975)** Wilder tried going the Mel Brooks spoofing route on his own as writer, director and star of this detective parody.

**"Silver Streak" (1976)** A terrific Wilder plays a train passenger who finds himself caught up in a mystery ... and in a partnership with Richard Pryor, in their first of several movies together. This completes TCM's Wilder double bill on April 24.

**"The World's Greatest Lover" (1977)** Again the writer and director here as well, Wilder plays one of the aspiring candidates to challenge Rudolph Valentino as a silent-screen superstar.

**"The Frisco Kid" (1979)** Wilder does excellent, seriocomic work as a rabbi in the Old West.

**"Stir Crazy" (1980)** Under the direction of Sidney Poitier, Wilder and Richard Pryor make much mirth as wrongly sentenced convicts.

**"The Woman in Red" (1984)** Also playing writer and director again, Wilder portrays a man whose obsession with a beautiful woman (Kelly LeBrock) proves problematic. Arguably the film's most enduring element is Stevie Wonder's hit song "I Just Called to Say I Love You."
