Republican B Iters.

Denver, July 18.—A special to the Republican from Maniton, Col., says: All of the silver men who are to confer on the great question of how best to unite the silver forces and bring glorious victory out of this campaign of the people against the gold monometallists are now here. The members of the conference present include Senators Teller, of Colorado; Mantle, of Montana; Pettigrew, of South Dakota, and Dubois, of Idaho; Congressman Hartman, of Montana; Wilson, of Idaho; Burchinal, of West Virginia, and Shafroth, of Colorado, and Hon. A. M. Stevenson, of Colorado.

The party got together in the rooms of Senator Dubois tonight and informally talked over the situation, discussing every phase of it, each offering suggestions as how best to promote the cause for which they are fighting.

Senator Teller submitted a draft of an address to the people which he had prepared, and Senator Dubois also offered some additional suggestions to be embodied in the pronouncement.

Senator Teller stated to the representative of the Republican that, although they had canvassed the situation pretty thoroughly, they would not be ready to give the address to the press until Sunday evening. It will be quite a lengthy document and will contain about 2500 words, fully setting forth the situation and conditions which confront them and which influence present action.

They will unequivocally endorse Bryan and Sewall, giving in detail their reasons therefore and outlining what they believe to be the best line of campaign for the silver forces. They each express the hope that the populist convention at St. Louis as well as the silver convention will indorse the nominee of the Chicago convention, but they are not particularly enthusiastic over the present prospects from the populists. None of them will attend the St. Louis convention.

Senator Teller's Attitude.

DENVER, July 14.—Senator Teller has returned to Denver from Maniton, where he has been in conference with Senator Dubois, of Idaho, and Congressman Hartman, of Montana, as to the course the silver Republicans shall pursue in the approaching campaign. They have postponed their conference until other silver senators can arrive. They will probably then issue a statement of their position.

Senator Teller makes no concealment of his intention to support Bryan for the presidency. He says he is satisfied Bryan will make the financial question paramount to all others in the campaign, and that if elected he will defend himself with great singleness of purpose to securing a return to national bimetalism. Teller believes that Bryan

is a strong candidate to begin with, and that he will constantly grow with the people.

Teller will not permit the use of his name at the St. Louis Populist or silver conventions.

No Wool Was Sold.

Four or five buyers were at Elgin, in Wallowa county, last week, and remained there several days but none of them were able to consummate any deals with the growers, as there were no offers made that would induce the wool men to part with their product. A representative of the Pendleton scouring mill was on the ground, and offered to make advances on large lots, but did not attempt to make any purchases. The warehouse at Elgin is jammed full, and some wool is stored in other buildings. Buyers have been bidding at Elgin for 500,000 pounds of Wallowa wool, slight shrinkage mostly, for part of which 6 1/2 cents was offered, says the Pendleton East Oregonian. The owners are holding for 9 cents, consequently no sales were made.

The wool from the surrounding country is about all in now, and aggregates very nearly 8,000,000 pounds, says The Dalles Times Mountaineer.

Stockmen Reported Killed.

Word has just been received from Canyon City, says the Baker City Democrat, of a fight between the cattlemen of the Izee country and the sheepmen of Crook county, in which two sheepmen and one cattleman were killed. The particulars of the fight were not received, further than that it was a conflict over the range of the South Fork country. Another messenger brings the news that it was the same sheepmen that had their wagons and provisions destroyed over there several weeks ago.
