A Remarkable Accident.

A lady on Sunday's westbound train told a passenger from Meacham of a remarkable incident that occurred Saturday out on the plains east of Oregon on the line of the Union Pacific railroad. A lady was traveling on the train with a three year old baby. She left the child in the seat at an open window and went to the end of the car to get a drink of water. During the momentary absence of the mother, the baby climbed into the window and before it could be reached fell out of the car, the train running at full speed. There was great excitement and the mother was frantic. No one thought of the bell chord, but several people went racing up and down looking for the conductor. By the time he was found so much distance had been covered since the accident happened that he refused to stop the train. With the mother almost crazed with the thought of the baby being dashed to pieces and its mangled body left on the plains, and she every moment being borne farther away from it, the train proceeded to the next station. From this point word was telegraphed back to the train which was following to look out for the baby. The mother waited at this station for the arrival of the other train and was filled with unbounded joy when the conductor placed in her arms the little loved one not only alive, but unhurt. It seemed that in falling from the window the child had fortunately fallen clear of the track and landed in the heavy grass and weeds beyond. It crawled farther away from the rails on to a raised piece of ground, and there cried itself to sleep over its unintentional desertion by mother and friends, and was still sweetly sleeping the sleep of childhood when found.—Baker City Blade.

A Jail Delivery.

Once more the Lake county jail is vacant. On Monday Jim Kendrick got out on bail, and yesterday morning when Deputy Sheriff A. J. Neilon unlocked the door of the jail to take W. L. Keyes to breakfast he found a small hole in the floor instead of a prisoner. There was a lengthy letter on the table addressed to Mr. Neilon, thanking himself and Sheriff Lane for the kind treatment which the prisoner had received, and regretting to put the county to so much expense for nothing, by staying until the fall term of court.

Mr. Keyes expressed no fears as to the outcome of this trial, but he was afraid that Man Whorton would take him to Portland on a charge of holding up the stage, after he went free from this charge. So, all things considered, he thought it best to end the proceedings at once.

It was the custom of the deputy sheriff to take the prisoners to the

Lakeview House for their meals, and they had managed to secret a small iron rod with a sharp prong on one end. With this Keyes opened the hole that had been patched in the floor when Jack Martin broke jail seven years ago.—Lakeview Examiner.

Philadelphia, Sept. 4.—As the result of an attempt to see how many cigarettes he could smoke in half an hour and to win a wager, 14-year-old George F. Ellwell died today.

Several newsboys were talking of cigarette smoking, and one of the crowd urged Ellwell to see how many he could smoke in half an hour. A small bet was made and two packs of cigarettes bought. The boy was lighting his twentieth cigarette when the half an hour was up.

The lad was taken sick during the night, and died this morning. The coroner who investigated the case said that death was due to excessive cigarette smoking, and more directly to the large number the boy smoked yesterday.

Portland, August 29—Advices from Oak Point this morning say that forest fires are still raging at that point and at Eagle Cliff on the Washington side of the Columbia river. It is impossible to get full particulars, but it is known that no lives were lost. The fire covers an area of ten square miles and is within three hundred rods of Oak Point. There is thought to be no danger here unless a northwest wind springs up.

It is estimated that over two hundred head of cattle have perished. The fire has assumed such proportions that nothing but a heavy rain will conquer it. The number of feet of timber already destroyed runs way up into the millions.
