

Inhuman Parents.

Chicago, Aug. 4.—Within the narrow confines of a dark, stuffy room at 722 West Van Buren street, little Pearl McCoy, a frail child of 10 years, has spent the last five months of her life in solitude. Yesterday, when the police called to investigate the case on the complaint of neighbors, it was found she had been stealthily removed by her parents. The police are making a search for her. A warrant will probably be issued tomorrow by Justice Kehoe for the arrest of the girl's parents and higher court proceedings will be commenced by the Humane Society in order to locate the child's whereabouts.

Ever since May last little Pearl, according to the testimony of kindly neighbors, has been confined in a dark room by her stepmother. The head of the house, Hugh McCoy, is a newspaper circulator. The occupants of the house consists of himself, his wife, a grown son and little Pearl.

Several weeks ago John Backadder, a next door neighbor, had his attention called to the child's presence in the small, gloomy room overlooking the court, and attempted to talk with her. Once she was caught talking with the neighbor and that night her window was nailed down. Since then other neighbors state they have plainly heard the sound of lashes, followed by the plaintive cries of the child. Backadder of late has been throwing books and fruit over the top of the window to the girl, but no persuasion made her divulge the secret of her confinement.

Big Indian Powwow.

La Grande, Sept. 1.—The citizens of Enterprise and vicinity are alarmed by reports that Indians are gathering in Wallowa with the intention of massacring the inhabitants, to avenge the death of the Indian recently lynched at Asotin for outraging a young lady of Enterprise. Miss Olive Richardson, the young lady who was outraged, has returned home. It is rumored that the Indians now encamped in that vicinity are seeking her life, and threaten to shoot her on sight. It is estimated that over 2000 Indians from the Nez Perce and Umatilla reservations are now encamped in the Wallowa valley. Today the Indians had a barbecue and powwow at their camp at the mouth of Trout creek, this being the time for celebrating the death of the Indian recently lynched. A number of prominent Indians present, besides the family and relatives of the dead man. The settlers have taken necessary precautions and warned everybody to stay away from the meeting, as they might thoughtlessly cause trouble, as the Indians will no doubt be worked up to a great frenzy, and, with the assistance of whiskey, some of them might resort to violence.

Hydrophobia Victim.

St. Augustine, Fla., Sept. 5.—Suffering with hydrophobia, Austin Miller, a prominent citizen of St. John county, is running amuck in the Moltrie neighborhood. While

out hunting a few days ago Miller was bitten by a polecat which he found in a trap. Symptoms of hydrophobia developed, and yesterday morning Miller became so violent that he was bound to his bed. During the afternoon, while in convulsions, he broke the ropes with which he was tied, leaped from the bed and sprang upon his son, who was in the room.

The sufferer fastened his teeth in the boy's face and mangled it severely. The blood seemed to make Miller more ferocious, and he bit the boy in a dozen other places.

Miller then fled from the house while wandering in the country the man met John Alexander, whom he tore with his teeth. He also met Henry Simpson, who was torn in a similar manner. The three victims were brought here today for treatment, but physicians say they cannot live. The Moltrie neighborhood is in terror, as Miller is still at large. Sheriff Perry and a posse left this afternoon, determined to kill the maniac if they could not capture him.
