Corvallis, Oct. 9 -The report of James H. Wilson, appointed to ex. amine the books of Benton county has caused much comment on the streets. The report shows an apparent shortage in the sheriff's office of more than \$9300, \$8600 of this amount during the incumbency of ex Sheriff Osburn, who retired last June, after serving two terms. The remainder is in the accounts of ex Sheriff Mackey, who preceded Mr. Osburn. Mr Mackey is in British Columbia and Mr. Osburn left for Montana a few days ago, so no explanation is offered for the alleged shortage.

In the county court yesterday Mr. Osburn was given until the next session of the court to explain or make good the apparent deficien cy. 




