Geter went to the hospital for treatment for a nervous trouble, and in making their examination the physicians discovered the misplacement of these important organs. There was no accident that caused a shifting of the heart and liver, and their location was caused by no disease. It is just a freak of nature, the doctors say. The boy was born that way and never knew till the physicians told him that he was a freak. The organs perform their functions satisfactorily, and Geter is rather proud because he is different from other men.

The physicians say the case is a rare one. Instances of the heart being on the right side have frequently been reported, but it is usually the result of some accident. The liver, however, has always been considered to have its location on the right side of the back, and no case has come under the hospital physicians' notice where it was otherwise.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch
