vices upon the board might interfere with his official duties in the Oregon City land office. This distribution of appointments recognizes eastern Oregon, southern Oregon and Willamette valley.

It is generally agreed that London fixes the price of the world's markets for all commodities, which is in a manner true, but it does not follow that the prices fixed in London prevail throughout the world. This appears to be true with reference to wool. Not being satisfied with the prices that prevailed here last fall, says The Dalles Mountaineer, Max Richter, of Mt. Vernon, Grant county, determined to try the experiment of shipping his wool to London, and he writes to his friend in this city that he has received returns from the sale thereof. The wool brought 12 1/2 cents and the expenses of shipping were 3 1/2 cents, leaving Mr. Richter 9 cents net for his wool. His wool was not of an extra quality, the best offer he could get here being 6 cents, so he has cleared 3 cents per pound by shipping to England.

In one of the windows of a local store is exhibited one of the curiosities of the age, says The Dalles Mountaineer. It is a mounted deer with large spreading antlers, and natural in every respect, except as to its color, which is snow white. The animal was killed on the desert near Prineville about a year ago.

Governor Lord has named the following as members of the Oregon state board of agriculture: Z. F. Moody, of Wasco county, to succeed J. H. Gray, of Crook, (who has been elected sheriff and requested the governor to make another appointment) for a term of four years, from December 1, 1895; S. H. Holt, of Jackson county, to succeed himself, for a term of four years, from December 1, 1896; F. C. Baker, of Multnomah county, to succeed William Galloway, of Yamhill, for a term of four years, from December 1, 1896. Monday night of last week, Paisley, in Lake county, was the scene of another robbery. This time the victim was Charlie Campbell, the Paisley blacksmith. Mr. Campbell had been working rather late that night, shoeing horses for Bart Conrad and Frank Bunting, the stage men. He had finished his work and taken the horses to the barn, and, on going back to the shop, two men stepped in and threw him on his back. One hand was tied to the anvil and the other to a ring in the wall, and he was gagged so that he could make no noise. Between \$400 and \$500 was taken from him. Mr. Campbell was not found until about 10 o'clock the next day, when some one heard him kicking the floor, and he was rescued from his trying position, nearly frozen to death. W. K. McCormack was immediately dispatched to Lakeview for the sheriff, who started out and overhauled two men, who had passed through from the north Tuesday. They were brought to town, but easily proved an alibi.
