

**Additional Locals.**

—The Morning Dispatch, of The Dalles, discontinued publication Friday.

—An exchange says the Indiana girl who wagered 1000 kisses on Bryan now admits that McKinley was the advance agent of good times.

—Hon. A. W. Gowan, of Burns, our joint senator, is visiting friends and relatives in the valley previous to the opening of the legislature, which convenes next Monday.—Heppner Gazette.

—A momentary hurricane struck Pendleton recently. The air was filled with flying sign boards, sticks, timbers, etc. A saloon building had its front blown in and the W. & C. R. engine house was demolished, the building was badly wrecked and strewn over the lot.

—A young man over near Heppner last week, says the Condon Globe, was entrusted with the money to bring home a good family sewing machine. The hopeful son carried off a neighbor's daughter, married her and brought her home, declaring that she was the best family sewing machine that he could procure.

State Superintendent G. M. Irwin will recommend to the next legislature the enactment of an amendment to the educational laws of the state, to add two more text books to the common school curriculum. They are civil government and good morals.

—Powder river valley farmers are having rare sport these days. They have inaugurated coyote round ups in which two or three hundred farmers take part. Mounted on horses and followed by packs of dogs they ride over the valley driving everything before them, and the dogs are given full opportunity to run down the coyote.

The surplus cattle have been pretty well cleaned out of Lake county this winter. The county has been scoured by local buyers lately, and they had difficulty in securing the number they wanted, says the Lakeview Examiner. Of course some are holding for better prices, but it is thought that some of the large cattlemen over the country are holding, and when they do let go prices will take a drop.

**Ed Meadow's Escape.**

Ed Meadows, who stabbed and seriously wounded School Supt. Williams at Prairie City recently has temporarily effected an escape, but it is only temporary, for when he is least expecting, an officer of the law will swoop down on him like a hawk on a chicken. He was

tracked and followed as far as Antelope, at which point it was learned that he had secured a fresh horse 30 hours before the arrival of the officers. This gave him such an advantage, that it was deemed useless to continue, and the sheriff's posse returned.
