

—The Baker City Democrat of recent date says; Hon. George Chandler, of Wingville, returned Sunday from the Willamette valley in advance of his cattle shipment from Marion county which arrived yesterday at the O R & N. stockyards. Mr. Chandler spent a month looking through the finest herds of Shorthorn and Hereford cattle in the state and after satisfying himself and making his selections purchased a carload of Shorthorn and Hereford bulls and heifers. The cattle were yesterday at the California stock corral and were inspected by a large number of Powder valley stockmen. The general opinion seemed to be that Mr. Chandler had eclipsed all former efforts in introducing thoroughbred cattle. One heifer only twenty months old was put on the scales and weighed 1332 pounds. The herd were driven out to Mr. Chandler's Wingville stock farm last evening.

Perhaps the first black walnut lumber ever manufactured on the Pacific coast from Pacific coast timber was sawed a few days ago at the mill of S. H. Horton, west of Monroe, says the Corvallis Times. The logs came from old Lancaster, two or three miles from Junction, and the trees were planted while the commonwealth was still in swaddling clothes. The logs were in dimensions from 12 to 15 inches and only a few hundred feet of lumber was made. The fiber is tough and the grain smooth and susceptible of the high polish usually seen in walnut furniture.
