Robert Jordan Talks.

AFTER THE TIMES HERALD had gone to press last Wednesday, we had a talk with Robt Jordan in the county jail and got him to make a statement which we give below. Jordan seemed to be very cheerful for a man under sentence for seven years in the penitentiary. He thought he would be out in five years, after which he would go to some place where this trouble was not known and be careful not to get in trouble in the future. The following is what he has to say in regard to his sentence and how he effected an escape a year ago:

"In the first place I want the statement made in a recent issue of the County News corrected. I have only served one term in the pen. I was never indicted on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon as was stated in that paper, there was only one charge against me and that was larceny. I had no woman with me by the name of Blalock; the lady that was with me is my wife, whom I left in Baker city when I was brought over here by the deputy sheriff.

"I will simply corroborate the statement made by my brother John, as to our getting away from here. Several days before our being let out, Gittings brought us up two chisels with the instructions that when the proper time came he would tell us and we were to work on a hole in the floor. It was never intended that we should go out through it, however. There was

no guard at the jail that night, and about 10 o'clock Gittings came and unlocked the door and said: "Now g—d—m you fellows get out of this, all of you." He finally said that if John and I went the other boys, Ben and Will, would come clear.

"After leaving here we went to the Owyhee and there I separated from John and never saw him again until being brought here.

"No, I have not seen Gittings since leaving here nor heard of him. My sentence, although not as long as I expected, is still, I think, more than I deserve and if I could have secured a new trial I am positive I could have established my innocence.

"I have been in Idaho, Montana, Washington and British Columbia since leaving here. I have not been in any trouble and if I had not been caught I would now be in British Columbia. I had come back after my wife, who was staying on Willow creek, Malheur county, and was on my way north."
