It Is Coming West.

Missouri Exchange: It is reported that the Burlington will soon commence work on its long projected extension to the Pacific coast. The road, it is said, is to not extend from Billings terminus of the Burlington, but to be built west from a point south of Sheridan, passing near the headwaters of the Little Powder river, skirting the southern line of Yellowstone park, thence in a tolerably direct line to Boise, Idaho, and across the Snake river into Oregon, whence two branches will be run to the coast, one south of the line of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Co. to Portland, and the other north through Washington to the Puget Sound. Substantially, this project was under consideration prior to the panic of 1893, and the story is revived by a local railroad man who claims to have positive assurance that it will be carried out.

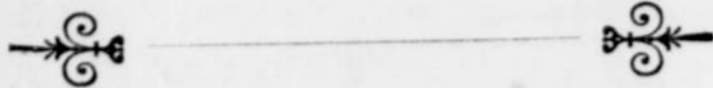
