**NO HARD TIMES IN HARNEY.**

**Senator Gowan L. eates the long-Missing Wave of Prosperity.**

"A wave of prosperity has struck Harney county," said Senator A. W. Gowan at the Perkins yesterday, says the Oregonian of June 9.

"The Hanley brothers, principal cattle-buyers and shippers of that country, are paying from \$3 to \$5 more a head for cattle than has been paid in the past ten years. Two-year old steers bring from \$23 to \$25, and the matured stock from \$30 to \$35, and others prices are in proportion. There are many Eastern cattlemen, from St. Louis, Omaha, Chicago and Minneapolis in the Harney country, competing with each other, and every stage brings in a shipper or a feeder. More cattle are now being shipped out of the Malheur and Harney countries than during the past four years. Interest is so great that stockmen living in Harney are now in Southern Oregon, buying large herds and driving them home across country.

"The hay crop of last season was the means of saving a good portion of the stock. While the winter was not severe, it was prolonged, and,

as it was, the hay became nearly exhausted before range feed was provided. The recent high water, overflowing the meadow lands, gives promise of a greater harvest, this year than ever before known in Harney valley.

"The price of sheep has shown a substantial upward tendency. Lambs that one year ago were a drug on the market at 75 cents now bring from \$1 to \$1.75, and sheep have advanced to \$2 and \$2.25. That is a good price. The wool crop of the Harney country will amount to about 500,000 pounds, and is now being moved to shipping points. Most of it goes to Ontario and Huntington, and some little to Baker City.
