The attention of school boards of this county is called to the letter of the State Superintendent to the County Superintendent, regarding the distribution of school laws. The school laws are not private property to be kept by the clerk or some member of the board after their term of office expires, but should in all cases be carefully cared for and turned over to their successors in office. There will not be sufficient copies to distribute as fully as might be desired, but it is my purpose that the County Superintendent shall supply each district in his county with one copy of the law, the same to be placed in the hands of the school clerk, that the same may be present at the time of any board meeting. I trust that the school boards will be careful with the copy furnished them, as it is not private property and does not belong to any individual, but is the property of the school board.
