Our American shipbuilders have not been as successful in the construction of torpedo-boats as they have been in turning out larger naval vessels. Of the six torpedo-boats built today, scarcely one of them has been a complete success. One of the recent boats has failed to make the speed required of her, while another met with a serious accident on her official trial, resulting in the breakdown of her engines and the serious wounding of some of her crew.

It will also be remembered that the torpedo-boat Ericsson, which was built over a year ago, had to be tried several times before she was finally accepted by the government. These failures in torpedo-boats are the more to be regretted as it was generally believed that in the matter of speed and endurance our torpedo-boats would prove superior to those owned by foreign navies. Why the boats so far constructed have proven faulty has not been divulged; but no doubt lack of experience in building these small vessels may be responsible. It is possible, however, that anxiety to complete the boats in a very short time may have led to faulty construction, and it is barely possible that in some instances inferior material may have been used.

It is to be hoped that careful tests will be made so as to determine exactly what has caused the torpedo-boats to fall short of expectations, so that the deficiency can be corrected in the case of the large number of boats now being built. The work which a torpedo-boat is expected to accomplish is too important to permit of any of the vessels being of less speed or of less endurance than the boats of possible adversaries. Moreover, it is certain that this country will build a large number of torpedo-boats within the next few years, hence it is important that defects discovered in the boats already completed should be avoided for the future.

The navy department is assembling a small flotilla of six torpedo-boats for a cruise during the winter into Southern waters. This cruise is for the purpose of familiarizing officers and men with the handling of torpedo-boats under service conditions.

As the bird was killed about two miles from salt water, it had evidently flown that distance with the clam fastened to its foot. It was not stated whether the tortoise was injured or not. The persons who had the other stories at once expressed their disbelief of this ancient chestnut. Another of the party remarked that he thought it not unreasonable, as there were doubtless some pretty good bars even in days of the Romans.
