A Hotel Experiment.

New York has undertaken an experiment in social economics which will be watched with interest throughout the largest cities in the world. A mammoth hotel, nine stories high, built of stone and firebrick, and equipped with baths, elevators, electric lights and steam heat, has been erected in the downtown slum district by Millionaire D. O. Mills for the patronage of poor but honest persons who have heretofore debarred from fair accommodations by the prohibitory prices. In appearance the new hotel is as palatial as any of the high-priced, first-class hostels. The office is decorated with costly marbles and the floors are of mosaic. The building cost about \$2,000,000 and the enterprise has been undertaken purely as a business investment. Lodging, including a private room with bath, will be furnished for 20 cents a night and meals will be served a la carte from 10 cents up. It is promised that the service shall be first class in every particular, and that absolute cleanliness will be enforced. It will be seen that under these rates a working man may have a private room and bath in a good hotel, with three meals a day and all the advantages of reading room and other hotel accessories, for \$3.50 per week.

The Ladies Home Journal has secured what promises to be the great magazine feature of 1898. It is entitled the "The Inner Experiences of a Cabinet Member's Wife." In a series of letters written by the wife of a Cabinet member to her sister at home, are detailed her actual experiences in Washington, frankly and freely given. They are absolutely fearless, they study Washington life under the searchlight as it has never been before presented.
