A BIG ROW.

Astoria, Or., April 13—Two republican conventions are in session for the second congressional district as the result of the efforts of both factions to secure the organization. Chairman C. H. Carey called the original convention to order at 10 o'clock. Smith of Wasco nominated C. D. Taylor of Umatilla for temporary chairman and, after putting the motion, declared it carried. Carey refused to recognize Taylor, and Rasmus of Multnomah nominated Otis Patterson of Beppner, whose election was declared by Carey amid great excitement. A division was called for and refused by Carey.

Both chairmen then took the platform. Concurrent motions for committees of five each on credentials and on business were entertained by both chairmen and declared carried by Taylor and lost by Patterson. The Taylor delegation and a majority of the delegates of Multnomah county left their seats, the others remaining.

The Mitchell men adjourned until Friday, the Simon faction continuing in session. The state convention will meet tomorrow and the fight between the factions from Multnomah county will be precipitated as soon as the convention assembles.

Republican State Convention.

After the big row at Astoria and the Simon faction of the Multnomah county delegation "oiled" the opposing faction in being seated in the convention things were smooth. It did not take a politician or even a very smart man to see that it was all "fixed" and any one opposing the bosses would be sat down on.

The platform declares for the gold standard and endorses the present administration. An amendment to the platform condemning the action of the last legislature for its failure to organize and elect a U. S. senator was defeated. It was evident that a majority of the delegates approved of the method and were quite willing it should be repeated if in that way they could knock out the man they did not want.

In every instance where a ballot was taken there were two or more votes cast than there were delegates. The following state ticket was nominated:

- Governor—T. T. Geer, Marion county.
- Supreme judge—F. A. Moore, Klamath county.
- State treasurer—C. S. Moore, Klamath county.
- Secretary of state—F. I. Dunbar, Clatsop county.
- State printer—W. H. Leeds, Jackson county.
- Attorney general—D. R. N. Blackburn, Lincoln county.
- Superintendent public instruction—J. H. Ackerman, Multnomah.
- Second congressional district—Macedon A. Moody of The Dalles.
- Ninth district—Judge, C. W. Perryish; attorney, Wm. Miller.
- Joint Senator, Morrow, Grant and Harney—A. W. Gowen.
- Joint Representative, Grant and Harney—R. N. Donnelly.

Fire broke out in one of the back rooms of the Hess Hotel last Thursday, during a severe wind storm, and but for the timely discovery and prompt action of Ben Jones, a serious conflagration would have occurred. Union in Oregon.

The platform adopted by the Populist, Democratic and Silver Republican parties of Oregon is broad enough for all of them to stand on. We are unable to see that anything omitted is of importance sufficient to justify the action of eighteen members of the Populist convention who declined to accept the platform and bolted. Unity of the three silver parties in Oregon means certain victory and disunion means defeat. When so much may be gained by union it is the height of folly and political blindness to endanger success in a fight for the paramount issue for the sake of some other issue which may be meritorious enough in itself but which can very well wait. It is presumed that the bolting populists will formulate a platform of their own and put a ticket in the field, but we hope the presumption is ill-founded. Should such a course be adopted, however, the chances are that the good sense of the voters of the party will prevent it from doing any harm. Nothing could be more than that the goldite-wind welcome anything creating a division in the ranks of the silver men and would be willing to spend considerable money to bring it about.

The action of the three parties in Oregon will have a good effect upon other states. When Oregon sets partisanship and petty jealousies aside silver men elsewhere will be inspired to emulate the example. The influence of the union will extend far east of the Rockies. It will be felt in Ohio and Indiana and other states where the gold managers are straining every nerve to bring about separation of the silver men. It is in harmony with the advice of Mr. Bryan, Mr. Towne, Senator Butler and Senator Jones, all of whom hope to see a solid union of silver parties, from ocean to ocean, in the approaching elections. We believe that their advice will be taken and their hope realized. We cannot conceive that the silver parties of Colorado will be so wanting in attachment to principle and so careless in other states as to take to quarreling among themselves at a time when every consideration which weighs with wise men impels them to union.—Denver News.
