County Platform.

1. We demand the free and unlimited holding of all our lands by the present bona fide settlers, independent of the action of any other party.
2. We demand that all money shall be loaned directly by the government of this state to the farmers and stock raisers at a low rate of interest, and that all money shall be loaned to the banks at a low rate of interest.
3. We demand that no contract, or law shall be made which shall require any money loaned by the government to be used for any other purpose than the benefit of the people.
4. We oppose the issuance of any internal revenue bonds in this state.
5. We oppose any and every legislation for the purpose of the payment of the public debt of this state.
6. We favor an income tax as a means of raising the revenue, necessary to maintain the federal government.
7. We demand the election of U. S. Senators by a vote of the people.
8. We demand direct legislation in some practical form.
9. We favor the redemption of Oregon from those corporations and trusts which are monopolies, and which are controlled by a few individuals.
10. We oppose any and every legislation for the purpose of the payment of the public debt of this state.

Washington, December 10, 1897. Oregonian, speaking of Mr. Tongue's recommendation says:

Mr. Tongue has great confidence and also have the other members of the Oregon delegation. The belief is becoming general that the fusion in Oregon, set up by the leaders, will fail in its effect, as the rank and file will not accept.

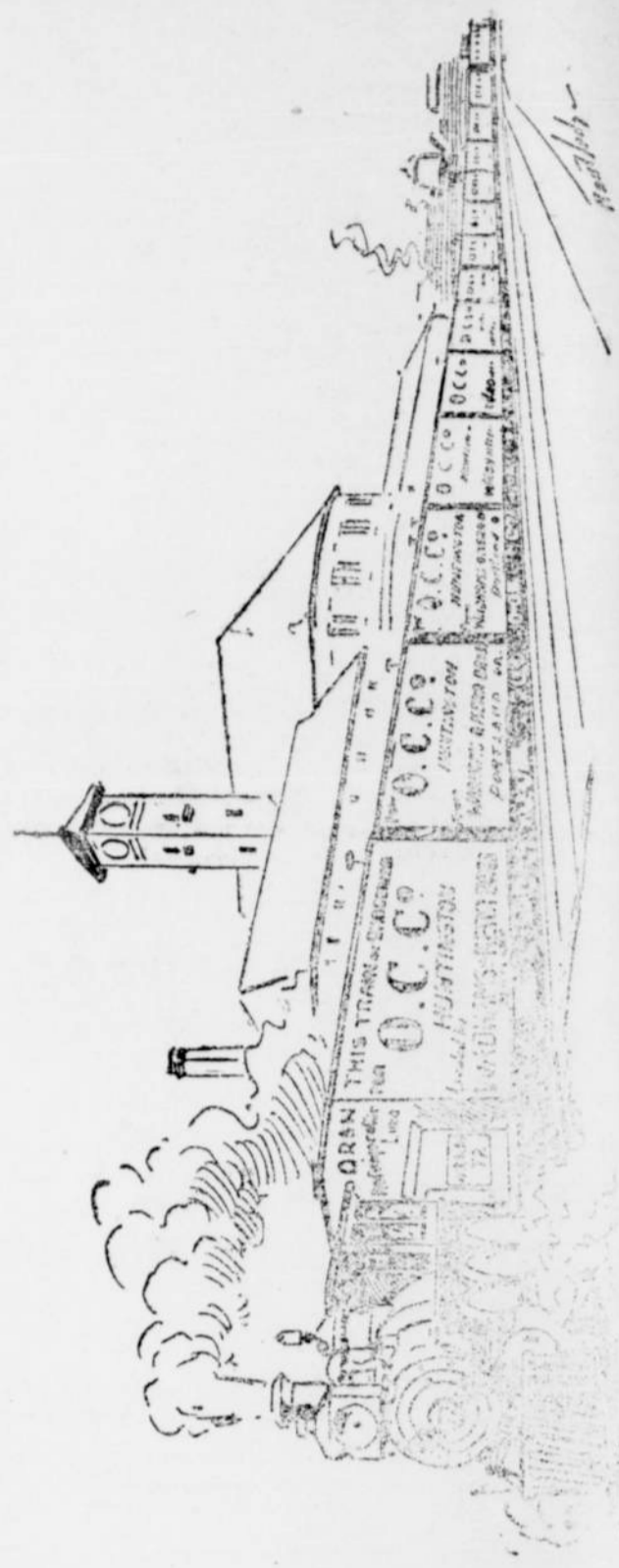
