County Platform.

- 1. We demand the free and unlimited exchange of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, independent of the action of any other nation.
2. We demand that all money shall be issued directly by the government, and that the circulation of banks and that all money, issued, be for gold, silver, or paper, shall be full legal tender for all debts, public and private.
3. We demand that no contract, or law shall discriminate against any money issued by the government.
4. We oppose the issuance of any international gold or silver coins.
5. We protest against any legislation for the retirement of the paper currency of the United States.
6. We favor an income tax as a means of raising part of the revenue, necessary to administer the federal government.
7. We demand the election of U. S. senators by a direct vote of the people.
8. We demand direct legislation in some practical form.
9. We demand the redemption of Oregon from the control of the Federal government, and demand home, self-reliance, self-protection, and a self-reliance, self-protection, and a self-reliance.
10. We pledge ourselves to reorganize the county and state expenditures and an effort to reduce the indebtedness of our county.

The republican state convention made a serious mistake, at Astoria, in putting up two county officials for important state offices, who are indirectly, if not directly, connected with or responsible for defalcations by which the taxpayers have lost large sums of money. Mr. Dunbar, county clerk of Clatsop county, for three years certified to the correctness of the semi-annual statements of a defaulting county treasurer.

Mr. Moore, county judge of Klamath county, consented to compromise with himself as the only solvent bondsman of the defaulting county treasurer, of that county, at about 35 cents on the dollar.

The republican candidate for state superintendent of schools is the candidate of the American Book Co. monopoly and helped fasten some of its most inferior text books upon the people at high prices.

If these statements are not founded upon facts The Journal will retract them and publish full explanations or denials. The cry that candidates on the Union ticket will be attacked does not answer these objections to the republican candidates. Hon. G. M. Irwin, state school superintendent, does not seem to be satisfied with the school books now furnished the pupils of the state, and thinks marked changes should be made in the works on geography and arithmetic. He also thinks the next legislature should regulate the prices of school books, as parents have to pay more for them now than the works are worth. The present contract for school books does not expire till 1901. If Prof. Ackerman, the republican nominee for state superintendent, is elected, the American Book Co., which is furnishing most of the school books, at outrageously high prices, will retain its present monopoly. On the contrary, if Prof. Lyman, the Union nominee, succeeds Supt. Irwin, there will be a change decidedly to the advantage of the people and their children.—Ex.

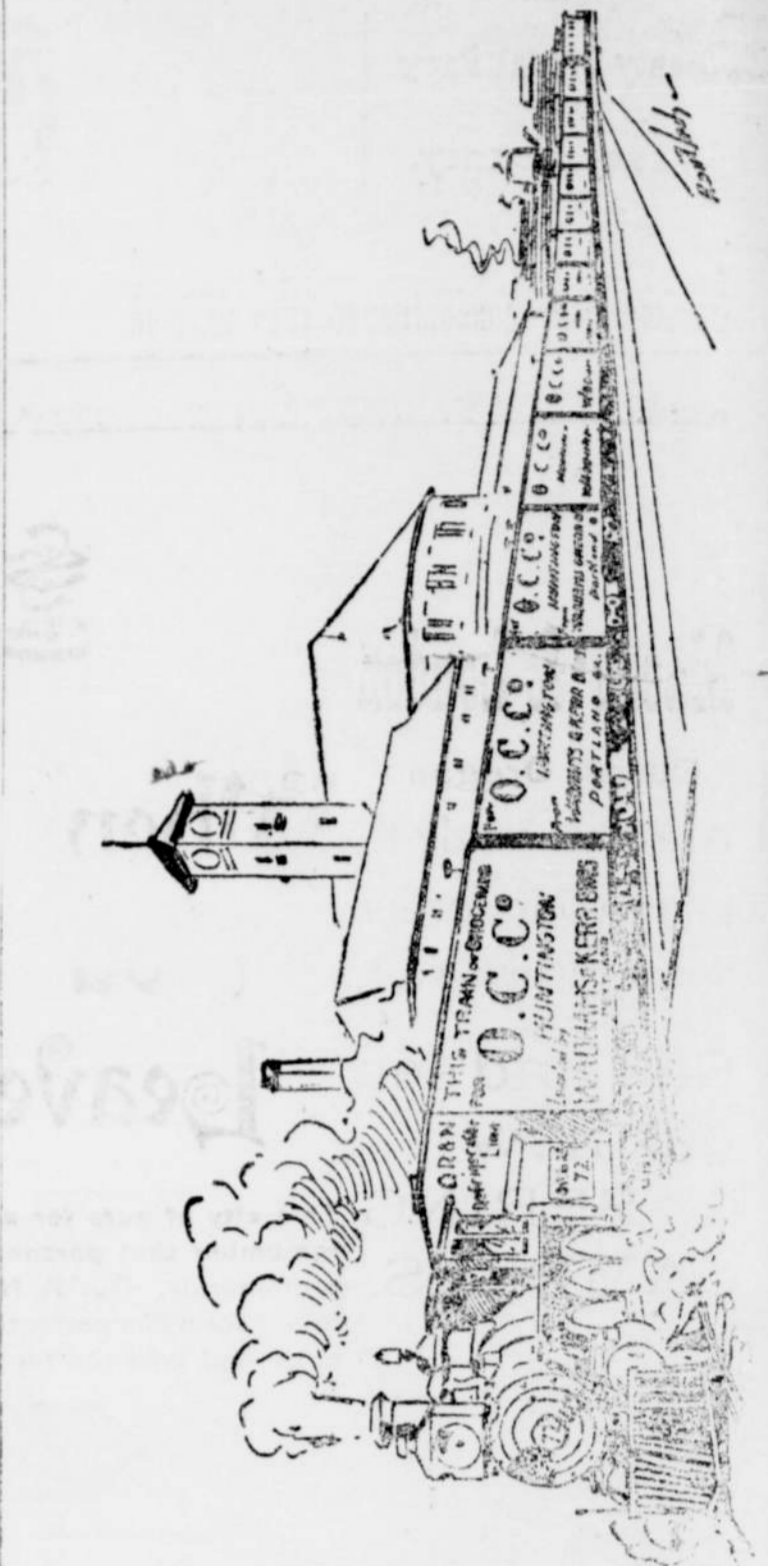
