United in a common cause for the sacred purpose of preserving the principles of government by the whole people, in fact as well as in name, resting and maintaining equality, under that government, of all classes, we, the people's democratic and silver republican parties of the state of Oregon, with all minor differences, and uniting for the purpose of carrying out the great underlying principle upon which we are all agreed, do make and present to the people of this state the following declaration of our principles and the carrying out of which we solemnly pledge each and every candidate upon our united ticket:
