On the other hand Judge Clifford has never been accused of neglecting or shirking a duty for political or any other reason. We predict that his majority over Parrish in this county will reach at least three hundred.

J. W. Buchanan, democratic nominee for assessor, has made a canvass of some of the precincts of the county, but will not be able to make a tour of the county on account of sickness in his family. Mr. Buchanan has been very well received in all the places he has visited and has received much encouragement from all parts. The office to which he aspires is one of importance and we think a majority of the voters recognize in Mr. B. a man who can fill the place to the best interest of the taxpayer.

Errett Hicks, union nominee for district attorney, who has been in Burns since last Wednesday in attendance upon circuit court, left this morning in company with L. Woldenberg Jr., to visit some of the precincts in the eastern part of the county. From reports received from his home in Grant county, we are confident he will be elected by a large majority. Mr. Hicks is an able lawyer and will always be found at his post of duty.

County Platform.

- 1. We demand the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the present ratio of 16 to 1, independent of the action of any other nation.
2. We demand that all money shall be issued directly by the government without the intervention of banks and that all money, whether gold, silver, or paper, shall be full legal tender for all debts both public and private.
3. We demand that no contract, or law shall discriminate against any money issued by the government.
4. We oppose the issuance of any interest-bearing bonds in time of peace.
5. We protest against any legislation for the relief of the paper currency of the United States.
6. We favor an income tax as a means of raising part of the revenue, necessary to administer the Federal government.
7. We demand the election of U. S. Senators by a direct vote of the people.
8. We demand direct legislation in some practical form.
9. We demand the redemption of Oregon from debt, corruption, and corrupt methods, and demand honest elections, election laws, including a full and free initiative law.
10. We pledge ourselves to retrenchment in county and state expenditures and an effort to reduce the indebtedness of Harney county.

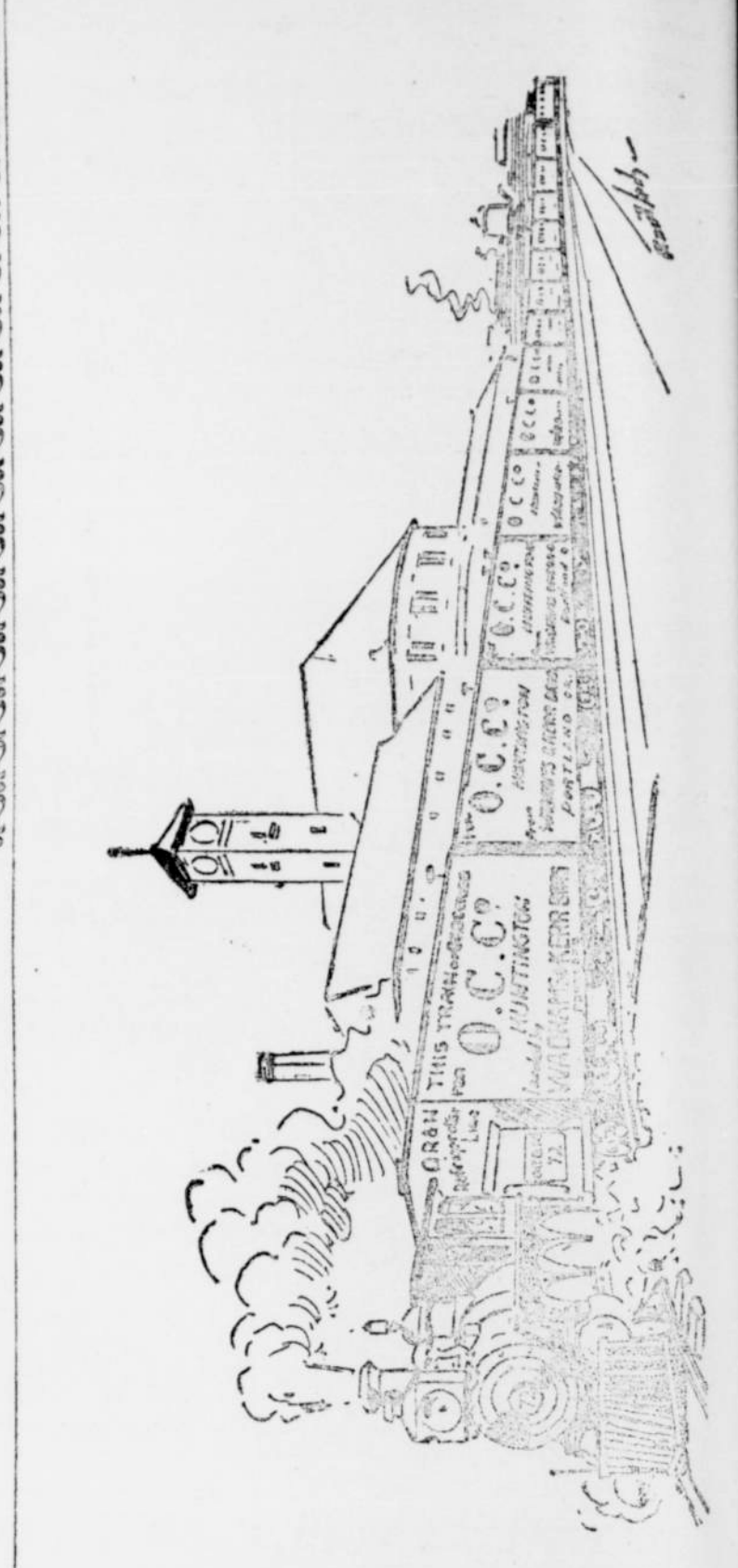
There was added to the tax roll of 1897, \$284,649.

Grand Jury Report. In the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Harney county. In the matter of the grand jury May 1898 term of said court. To Hon. Morton D. Clifford, judge of said court. We your grand jury for the above entitled term respectfully report, that we have been in session seven days, and have found two "true bills" of indictment, and one "not true bill," and have investigated other complaints made before the grand jury. That we have examined as well as we could, in the limited time at our command, the books of account of sheriff, treasurer, and clerk, and find that the same are neatly and well kept, and that the balances of such officers agree; we also find the officers of the different county offices clean and in good order. We would recommend to the county court of this county, that a steel grate door be placed in front of the county jail outside of the present wooden door therein, and that an addition be made to the vault in the clerk's office, for the reason that the same is not large enough to conveniently contain the records of that office, and we further recommend to said court, the erection of an urnal not far from the back door of the court house, as the same would be of great convenience to those attending court, and would add to the prob-
